UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT LOAN TO THE LIBERIAN GOVERNMENT

It is sometimes bad policy and diplomacy to make public retorts in reference to even misstatements that are made concerning governments or highly placed representative men in public life. It is sometimes equally as bad diplomacy and policy to refrain from correcting erroneous statements about governments and the representatives of governments when such statements are calculated to destroy confidence and

William Randolph Hearst, the notorious American agitator and publicist, recently launched a propaganda against legitimate loans to many of the great European nations and some of the smaller government.

Following up his onslaught, Mr. Hearst more recently in the New York American a couple of weeks ago p slished a characterization sketch of several governments, including the Black Republic of Liberia. Mr. Hearst represented that country to be primarily a settlement of mulattos, a nondescript government with considers a "farcial government" and that will never be able to meet the obligations. 

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

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
