Fellow Men of the Negro Race, Greeting:

There are times when we must be serious with each other. Such a time is now. We are serious because we have a serious program to put over in a serious world. The world in which we live is so serious that the life of races and nations amounts to very little. Men and races die and nations change, a process that has become eternal, yet in the midst of all we must prepare ourselves to live, and so the Universal Negro Improvement Association is working with might and main not only to make the Negro race live through its length of days as numbered by the Great Almighty, but to resurrect from the ruins of the past our ancient glory and honor and establish ourselves once more as a national force.

Rally to the Standard

Tending toward this end, we call upon the four hundred millions of our people the world over to rally to the one standard, the standard of race love, of race pride, of race unity and of race independence; the standard that spells the emancipation of the entire race. It is such a program that we call upon you to support today. Our fourth international convention has just risen. During its deliberation the delegates and deputies from all parts of the world decided that the most solid foundation the Negro could lay at this time was that of firm and secure industrialism. We decided that we would, through the Black Cross Navigation and Trading Company, lay such a foundation in industry and commerce as to guarantee the future economic existence of our race, and now we are calling upon you for the support necessary to make this possible.

to this corporation what they can afford. Help us to make this first ship a success so that we can have others, and thereby build up a stronger merchant marine and expand our usefulness to the race throughout the world. There are fields yet to conquer for the Negro race in industry and commerce. The teeming millions of Africa are to be clothed, fed and taken care of with the necessities of life. Let us manufacture these things in the United States of America and the western world and ship to them, and let us take from them their raw materials, their palm oil, coffee, coca and hides which we can

use in our factories, thereby insuring employment for the millions who in a short while will be thrown out on their own resources.

Laying the Foundation of the Future

We must lay the foundation now for the future. Don't wait until the future stares you in face with its hardships and difficulties before you realize what should be done. Realize what is to be done and do it now. If you have \$100 loan \$50 to the Black Cross Navigation and Trading Company. 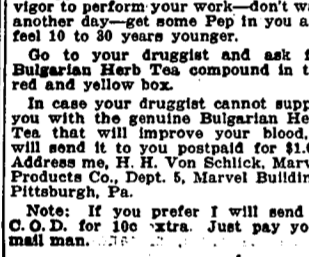

King George Decorates West Indian Physician

LONDON, Aug. 30.—Dr. Samuel Benjamin Jones, a West Indian Negro, who received his medical education in the United States, has been awarded by King George the Order of Member of the British Empire in recognition of meritorious services rendered in combating a smallpox epidemic in the British West Indies in 1923.

When an epidemic of smallpox swept the Leeward Islands Dr. Jones used wholesale vaccination to check the disease—a plan introduced in North Carolina several years ago by Dr. W. S. Rankin of the State Board of Health, which was a departure from isolating patients and those exposed to smallpox. Dr. Jones' method was so successful as to attract the attention of medical authorities in England.

Dr. Jones received his early education in the government schools of the West Indies. He went to the United States shortly after being graduated from college. He stayed in New York several weeks, deciding to live in the South. For two years he taught at Shaw University, Raleigh, N. C., then studied medicine at Loyola University, Chicago.

In 1915 he became head of the Department of English at the Agricultural and Technical College, Greensboro, N. C., and also served as college physician. In 1916 Dr. Jones married the daughter of Dr. James B. Dudley, the institution's president. In 1917 he returned to the British West Indies with his wife and became connected with the British medical service there.

MOB LAW STILL RAMPANT IN THE BRUTAL SOUTH

No Lull in Lynching as Reported—Newspapers and News Agencies Suppressing News; That Is All

(As Seen by a Baptist Official)

That mob rule still prevails to a great extent in the South is attested to by the corresponding secretary of the National Baptist Convention, who in his travels in the South was brought face to face with conditions which have put to rest the talk of better treatment of Negroes in the South which has been broadcast so frequently during the past six months.

Writing in the "Mission Herald," the official organ of the Foreign Mission Board of the National Baptist Convention, the secretary says: "As we travel over the Southland through the States of South Carolina, Georgia, Mississippi and Louisiana, we are constantly dying the conditions of our people and the relation of the races. In many places, the tremendous progress being made by the colored people is most gratifying.

Many of them are doing so well and living under such good circumstances they would not think of breaking up their homes and leaving the South, yet mob rule often threatens to shake the very foundation of our people's security in every part of the South. One doesn't read so much now in the papers about lynching of colored people as was read a few years ago. It is being argued everywhere that the white man is treating the colored man better, only to keep him in the Southland. This argument is made because so much less is seen in the papers of mob rule these days, but during our last trip over the Southland we were made to wonder more than once whether or not the press is only silent as to lynch and mob rule, which is as widely prevalent today as it was before the migration.

"The very Saturday we got into Pine Bluff, Ark., the policeman at the station, a very rough kind of man, started a little row that almost led to a race riot. In some way he brushed against a colored girl. She resented his action. He knocked her down. The husband of this young woman said: 'She is my wife; you need not hit her like that to arrest her.' At once the policeman struck him down. While he was beating the colored woman, who was probably 25 or 26 years of age, another little colored man walked up with fire in his eyes, his lip quivering, his blood almost to the boiling point, and said to the officer: 'Stop beating that girl. If you hit her again, you will never hit anyone else in this world.'"

The chief of police, who was standing nearby, at once joined in and raised his club to strike this brave colored man, but the colored men enjoined quickly, as he called the name of the chief of police: 'Do not hit me; you do not hit me today.' The chief of police must have seen something in this little Negro, for he changed his mind and did not strike him. This girl, who was bleeding from the beating by the policeman's club, together with her husband and the other gentleman who intervened, was started off to jail, but somehow she broke loose and ran away from the policeman. He shot at her three times in quick succession. Another policeman reentered her. When another colored man, one of the hundreds who had gathered around, remarked that it was a shame for that poor colored girl to be beaten up like that, he was at once arrested. All were lodged in jail, and no plea to bond the young woman so that she might have medical attention had any effect on the powers that be, and all had to stay in jail that night. On Wednesday morning a lawyer was secured so that the best terms would be gotten for the prisoners. Witnesses on the stand stated clearly that the policeman had unnecessarily beaten up this young woman and her husband.

The chief of police witnessed against the other man that he swore, and said if the policeman hit that girl again, he would not hit any one else in this world. This brave young fellow still revealed his manhood. He told them: 'I am a church member, I have never sworn since I have been in church. The chief of police has made a mistake. He may have heard some one else swearing, but I did say if the policeman hit that woman again he would never hit any one else in this world and I meant it.' All present, white and black, could not help admiring the real manhood that was demonstrated in every look and act of that young colored fellow. The court put a light fine of \$10 on the man and wife, and on the young man who intervened a fine of \$25. The latter at once told the court the best thing for him to do was to sell out everything he had and go away, for he saw that no colored man could get a square deal in that town. The chief of police called him back into his office and talked with him very kindly, and advised him always in the future when he saw a fight to get away and not to stand anywhere near. In other words, if he saw a great big officer mercilessly beating up a little colored woman, he must leave the scene and not stand anywhere near. The Ministers' Alliance decided to take the matter up, and make a petition to the government. We have heard no more about it. We have carefully watched the papers for this incident that caused so much excitement around the station at Pine Bluff, where hundreds of colored people gathered while this

beating and shooting was going on, but not one line appeared in the papers concerning it. To the reader every thing was calm and pleasant, and the races were getting along fine in Pine Bluff when this happened.

The day before we got into Meridian, Miss., a mob had gone to the jail in one of the nearby towns and taken out a colored man and hanged him without a trial. He was accused of assaulting some white woman. We saw an account of that in the press.

Some few days before we reached Canton, Miss., two officers had gone to a country place to arrest a man who was supposed to be stopping with his brother, but the men could not find him, though the house was searched. Late in the night they returned to the house and asked for him. They were told that the brother had not turned up. They wanted to search the place and did search it, all but one room where some young ladies were sleeping. The owner of the house asked them not to go into that room, as young ladies were sleeping there. The second time he insisted, and at such insistence, one of the officers said to him, 'you don't know who I am,' reaching for his gun at the same time. The wife of the colored man jumped in between her husband and the white officer, begging for her husband, but to no avail. He simply reached over the shoulder of the wife and shot the colored man dead, and leisurely went on back to town. This incident did not appear in any of the daily papers. To the reading world everything was going all right in Canton the day it happened.

We were just wondering, as we see these sad conditions, whether or not many things are happening throughout the Southland that are being withheld from the press in order that public sentiment might not be in favor of migration of the Negro folk.

WHEN THE WORLD HAS TOO MANY MOUTHS TO FEED

There MAY Be War and Pestilence and Help from the Laboratory—But the Weak WILL Die

More than a century ago Malthus pointed his warning that misery impended for all the prisoners on this globe of ours because the population was increasing more rapidly than the means of sustenance. It has taken all this time for us to hit upon a solution of the problem. Consider the proposal of Prof. Henry Pratt Fairchild at the Institute of Politics in Williamstown, Mass., that mankind breed for smaller size.

Possibly Prof. Fairchild may have been misunderstood. Any householder will tell you that platters must be heaped as high for small men as for large. The real solution lies not in the stature of the diners but the number of them. What Prof. Fairchild may have meant is that we breed for larger size. And so, when the matter finally worked out, there would be room for fewer men on this planet and need for fewer trenchers. But the fearful

thought remains to be answered. What would we do with our heirs when all the room was taken?

It is indeed a problem, this swift increase of population. In the last century it went up from 700,000,000 persons to 1,700,000,000, says Prof. Fairchild. Prof. J. W. Gregory, president of the Geographical Section of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, speaking at its recent meeting at Toronto, declared that in 120 years the earth would not be able to provide enough food for its population, and that by the year 3000 there would be standing-room only, except in the polar regions. Here is a terrifying picture of the overcrowding of the earth, with famine, pestilence, war and all attending evils just around the corner. Mankind is facing one of those monstrous menaces that every species

which so far has dominated its surroundings has had to face, something as destructive as any geological convulsion could be.

But a peek into our chemical laboratories, a glimpse about us on the streets, brings some reassurance. Even now some persons are agitating for a limitation of the birth-rate. Even now scientists are studying the possibility of synthetic substitutes for the foods we have gathered hitherto from the largess of the earth. Between them, perhaps, they may bring about a postponement of the crisis for an aeon more. And then what? Shall we bridge the gap to younger planets awaiting reclamation?

It is alluring speculation. But the danger is still so remote that it does not seriously disturb the present generation.
