Fellowmen of the Negro Race, Greeting:

Confined as I am in my prison cell my heart grieves within me when I read the newspapers and magazines from many countries and learn of the concentrated efforts of the leading nations of the world to hold the weak and oppressed peoples in further subjection, while within our group, and even in the fold of the Universal Negro Improvement Association, there are those who are but the tools of the oppressors, their paid agents, used to destroy the force of this great organization and thereby make the path of the ravager in Africa easy.

On the other hand, I am pleased to note the stand that has been taken by many loyal sons of Ham against the perfidy of others. The Committee of Presidents, Messrs. Ware, Toote, Haynes and Craigen, were elected at a Conference of Presidents of large divisions in America. This conference, called by Mr. Sherrill, without my knowledge or permission, discussed the affairs of the Association and the Black Cross Navigation and Trading Company, and, following an investigation by the Committee, it was decided that in order to place the Association upon a firmer footing, a change of the chief officers was imperative. The Committee felt that in this way men might be secured who would truly and honestly interpret the spirit and programme of the Universal Negro Improvement Association and protect the properties and investments of the people. I have gone carefully into the documents they presented regarding their investigations and I heartily endorse their recommendations which include the calling of a Convention to remove and replace some of the present officers.

Being a prisoner I am unable to lay before you full details of the intrigue and disloyalty of some of my associates to whom I entrusted the work of the Association. I have done everything possible to get the authorities to place me in a position to protect your properties, or to do so themselves, but I have failed, and now I implore the members of the U. N. I. A. to rouse your divisions, branches and chapters as never before to select and elect the most intelligent and sincere members to represent you at the coming Convention. Send to Detroit men who cannot be bought and who cannot be swayed from doing right by eloquent speeches and the promise of a job. The alien oppressor is scattering plenty of gold, and I warn you members to be on the look out for those who fall a prey to graft and try to destroy what it has taken us years of toil to accomplish.

The eyes of the world are on you, and may God guide you all at this crucial hour, and let nothing weaken your determination in the work of African Redemption.

LET'S PUT IT OVER THE CRISIS IN SOUTH AFRICA

ALL the information coming out of South Africa goes to show that the relations of the European whites and native blacks are fast reaching the breaking point. There are only 1,500,000 white Europeans in the Commonwealth as against 6,000,000 natives, and these latter are increasing so rapidly as to alarm the whites, who have so many privileges that they are styled by European correspondents as "the white aristocratic rulers." That is what it amounts to. It is also generally admitted that the natives are not only gaining in population but that they are gaining in intelligence and co-operation, with strong leaders of their own, who are standing firm for the rights of the natives and are commanding more respect than at any other time. General Hertzog, the new premier, recently stated what is regarded as his policy in dealing with the natives. He does not think they can have equality with the whites in the voting and should not have economic equality with the whites in the various industries, and that they should be segregated into a territory of their own with qualified self-government. He would give the "mutatoes" equality with the white whites.

The leaders of the natives are opposed to the Hertzog program, and with good reason. They are to be given a segregated territory of their own, where it is to be found and why should they be limited in their self-government? It is generally understood that the sop thrown to the "mutatoes" is for the purpose of dividing the native forces; and if they are to remain in the Union they insist upon a larger measure of civic participation in the government and a more liberal economic policy. The main point is that the natives have their own organization and leadership and that the government feels that it must consider these facts in settling the questions in dispute. It has not been this way in the past in any part of Africa ruled by Europeans. The natives have not been consulted at all; they have just been legislated for and ruled without their consent. It is generally conceded that the native Africans have caught the spirit of the Universal Negro Improvement Association, with Africa for the Africans and conservation of Negro social and economic values for Negroes, and this doctrine is rapidly spreading throughout Africa and disquieting the lordly Europeans a great deal, more so than ever before. This spirit, we are assured, is bound to spread among native Africans, and with it a larger outlook upon life and a livelier appreciation of their own values of whatever sort. Native organizations are doing a great, good and necessary work in spreading the gospel of race organization and leadership and many contentions for native rights. The name of Marcus Garvey is one of inspiration and hope among native Africans, who see in his constructive principles the redemption of Africa and the conservation of Negro values.

The crisis in South Africa will not come to a head until the situation is ripe for it, but it is coming, and that is the main thing. Blacks and whites alike recognize this fact. It is good that it is so.

THE ROCKEFELLER GIFT TO OLD EGYPT

IT is natural for a large part of mankind to worship wealth. That is to say, the disposition to worship the thing we create and which should be our servant rather than our master, is very general. It was so among those of ancient times, and it is obviously so among the moderns. The average person bows to wealth and to those who occupy the high seats. That may be because the major part of mankind does not think very rapidly and must look to others to do his thinking for it. This is very largely the case, although the average person is not aware of it, and resents accordingly. Him of being such as an affront. And yet the great mass of mankind does not do its own thinking and would sink to a dead level if left to itself to do it. That is the most imperative reason why those who are able to think and to lead should be loyal and true to those who must follow, who must be directed, in the way they should go. "How shall the people know if they have no teacher?" exclaimed Paul, the chief apostle to the Gentiles. And so the masses everywhere, now as in the past, look to the few who have been blessed above their fellows, to think for them and to direct them in all the great events which come along invariably in the life of every race, every family, every nation.

The John D. Rockefeller family are among the richest families in the world. They amassed their wealth in the oil business, in which they were intelligent pioneers, as Andrew Carnegie and others were pioneers in the steel industry. The Rockefellers have more public spirit, have a more general interest in the welfare and well doing of mankind, than the average rich. They are not selfish. They have made princely contributions to education, in which the American people have shared liberally, to original research in medicine and the sciences, and to purely charitable help for worthy causes and institutions. And rich Americans are more generally generous than other countries disposed to the charity which embarks in great and helpful movements. They give more liberally to needy people than the rich of other countries, and they give not only to

their own needy but to the needy of the world, and that with little regard to the vexed question of race and color.

America is the youngest, strongest and wealthiest of the nations. Egypt is among the oldest. That the young civilization should look up to and revere the old is in the natural order, but it does not always follow. Mr. John D. Rockefeller has just announced the gift of ten million dollars to Egypt for the purpose of building a suitable museum and institute of research in archeology, in which Egypt is most rich, and other things. Mr. Rockefeller's realization of this fact has led him to make his princely donation. It has not been accepted by the Egyptian government, because of conditions of control attached to it, but there is hardly a possibility that satisfactory understanding will not be reached in the course of the negotiations.

European exploration and discovery in Egypt have done much to enable scholars to reconstruct the history of the ancients, and it is rightly believed that the Rockefeller gift will help to extend and further systematize the work already done and being done. It is possible that we shall have an entirely new reading of the history of Egypt and the wonderful people of the Nile country. The African people are bound to benefit by discoveries which enlarge our knowledge of Egypt and the Nile country and enable us to rewrite history from the standpoint of the facts rather than of fiction. This will be a great gain, because of its influence upon the thought and aspiration of the African people, who never in modern times have shown a more general and intelligent interest in their past and in estimating their present values of whatever sort.

Modern civilization owes Old Egypt more than it does the civilization of Greece and Rome, which borrowed liberally from Egypt. Mr. Rockefeller's gift will help to bring out the truth more strongly than we have it at present.

MAHATMA GANDHI REFUSES TO LEAVE INDIA FOR WEALTH

MAHATMA GANDHI, the mystic leader of the East Indians, sacrificed a great fortune and his high standing as a lawyer in order to serve the people of India in their conflict with their British rulers for some justice and fair play in the conduct of their own affairs. He who was greatest among them in India, greatest in wealth and reputation, became least in these respects in order to accomplish a great work of unifying the varied and confusing thought and concentrating the divided efforts of the East Indians to get what they desired. It was a great sacrifice that Gandhi made. Many great men, among the greatest, of the past who have led reformations, have suffered such fate as has befallen Gandhi. In like manner it has befallen our own Marcus Garvey. Gandhi may die in poverty and be buried at the expense of his followers, but he will have the satisfaction that he served his people and not himself. If his people forget him not, very good; but curiously, the disposition of the people has always been to desert and forget those who give their all that they might have much. Those who make the great sacrifice might be deterred from doing so if they should soberly consider the cost. The people are usually unthankful. They easily forget those who have served them most faithfully and unselfishly. They did so with Jesus and with most reformers since He was crucified on the cross. The true reformer does not count the cost to him personally. He counts rather the good he may do for mankind by his sacrifices.

Mahatma Gandhi has been invited to make a lecture tour of the United States, with a princely offer in money, but he has declined it in order that he remain in India and help his people at close range in their many troubles. It is the supreme spirit of unselfishness which so rarely manifests itself. When it does people marvel at it; although there is nothing new about it, mainly because the world is selfish and prone to pursue its own greedy phantoms. The New York World, having in mind the disposition among distinguished men and women of Europe to accept lecture engagements in the United States, in order to replenish their pocketbooks and to make more reputation for themselves, says: "And he refuses all this just to stay in India, because he thinks that he belongs in India. The man must be crazy." But the World was far from serious in saying "the man must be crazy," and that he thinks that he belongs in India. Gandhi is not crazy, although very fanatical in his devotion to the Indian people and their interests; and he thinks he belongs in India now because the people need him in India. If he could serve the Indian people better by lecturing about their troubles in the United States than by remaining in India and giving them the benefit of his presence and counsel, he would tour the United States! That is his viewpoint, the supreme test of sincerity in a cause, and the people of India, we believe, will so regard it.

TEN MILLION GIFT OFFERED TO EGYPT

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Would Finance Museum in the Land Where Culture is Oldest—Research Institute Proposed
John D. Rockefeller, Jr. has offered to King Fuad and the Egyptian nation the sum of \$10,000,000 for the erection and maintenance in Cairo of a great museum and archaeological institute.

This fast became known through premature announcement of the gift by Prof. James H. Breasted of the University of Chicago, who at present is in Egypt, and who will be chairman of the trustees of the new museum if King Fuad accepts certain conditions for its establishment.

Both Sides to Be Heard By Senate in Filipino Independence Fight

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—In answer to an inquiry in the Senate today about hearings on the question of independence for the Philippines, Senator Willis of Ohio, chairman of the Committee on Territories and Insular Possessions, said that full opportunity for a hearing would be afforded the opposing sides in the question. Hearings are conducted there will be opportunity for both sides to be heard fully.

Senator King pointed out that representatives of the government had been heard and strongly had opposed carrying out the pledge under the Jones act, and that various "exploiters" of the Philippines also were opposed to independence.

DON'T AVOID, BUT SEEK RESPONSIBILITY

IT is the comparative few who control the affairs of the world. Merely of governments, leaders of groups, etc. The masses herd-follow leadership, be that leadership good or bad, wise or unwise.

One cannot hope to aspire to leadership without assuming responsibilities both grave and heavy. The white race of this age is the most advanced because of the readiness of its individual members to shoulder responsibilities.

As a slave the Negro looked to his master for food, shelter and guidance. He had no will of his own. The white man told him when to sleep, eat or work; hence this emancipated Negro has a long way to go before he will throw off the yoke and act on his own initiative and himself plan and execute.

It is this fear of responsibilities that causes some Negroes to view Marcus Garvey's plans for nation building in Africa as impossible. Because white men do not direct the Universal Negro Improvement Association like other "civilized" organizations such as the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and the National Urban League, they cannot see how this black machine of ours can run without the master's touch.

"Side-stepping responsibility" would make a fitting epithet to describe anything to society—people who never achieve independence, never make anything of themselves.

"No man who is afraid to trust himself will ever amount to anything." No man will ever know what is in him until he is put to the test by the responsibility of an absolutely independent position, until he is forced to bring out his reserves, to exercise his utmost ingenuity to solve big problems for himself.

In small matters as in great ones, in individual as in group affairs, one must have faith in oneself, which eliminates fear, and places one in the state of mind to accept responsibility. Herein lies the salvation of the race, because we will then evolve a race of men and women equal in ability to others and standing on its own feet, heading not the white man's bidding; but being our own masters in all fields of endeavor.

GERMANY'S ATTITUDE TOWARD PROHIBITION

Women Not Eager for It, Although They Seek Reforms. There is no chance whatever that Germany will go dry in the near future. In the opinion of Frau Dr. Adere Schreiber, leading German feminist and prohibitionist, on the contrary, she believes the consumption of alcohol has become greater in recent years while the number of public houses shows an increase.

"There is a general inclination against prohibition in Germany," Frau Schreiber told the United Press. "The few adherents of prohibition belong to all classes of society, but, similarly, the adherents belong to all classes, and a resolution of the Reichstag in favor of a German Volstead act would unite all parties from the Fascist to the Communists."

"Women in Germany, as elsewhere, oppose alcoholic excesses; but, strangely enough, their support of the cause of prohibition is feeble. It is significant that when the Socialists moved to the Reichstag in 1919, the first resolution they voted against was that of the law, while among 18 Deputies who abstained from voting there was a woman. Of course, the number of women who at least wanted to discuss this law was greater, comprising 20 out of 165 Deputies."

ANGELICAN BISHOP FOR STERILIZATION

Famous Surgeon Also Would Limit the Unfit. LONDON.—The Rev. Dr. E. W. Baring, Bishop of Birmingham, was an outspoken defender last night in advocacy of restrictive measures against breeding of the unfit. Such repression, he maintained, would be in accordance with the plan by which his lordship has sought to limit the number of his subjects.

The occasion for the address was a meeting of the League Educational Society. The bishop contended that the society unit was an impediment to the creation of what Christians termed the Kingdom of God on earth, and that when religious people realized that a country that refused to repressive action against degenerates would cease.

Conciudadanos de la raza: Se me informa que los recientes acontecimientos desarrollados en la conducción de los asuntos de la Asociación Universal para el Adelanto de la Raza Negra y sus corporaciones auxiliares, ha motivado que un comité de presidentes de las primeras divisiones constituidas de la organización, actúen en favor de los socios en general y de los tenedores de bonos en dichas corporaciones auxiliares, para hacer ciertas investigaciones y tomar ciertos pasos tendientes a conservar nuestros intereses y dar mejor curso progresista a nuestro movimiento, el cual a pesar de la mala administración y oposición organizada en contra de su marcha racional y lógica, este se encuentra hoy día mas fuerte que nunca en los anales históricos de su desenvolvimiento.

Podrís formar juicio exacto de la situación existente, despues que hayáis leído con detenimiento del criterio que haga este comité de presidentes y cuya publicación se dará a luz en las próximas ediciones de este semanario. Por lo que a mi respecta esta demás el decir que las circunstancias en que me encuentro me prohibieron el poner ante vosotros tan lamentable situación. En septiembre del pasado año busqué todos los medios posibles para conseguir se me permitiera salir de esta prisión e ir a la oficina general de la organización en Nueva York, para tratar de redimir la situación caótica que se acentuaba; pero atado de pies y manos, estando recluso en una prisión y no dándoseme oportunidad, me fué de todo punto imposible proteger vuestros cuantiosos intereses.

He apelado recientemente al Departamento de Justicia pidiéndole permiso para ir a Nueva York, con el objeto de sanjar todas las cuestiones pendientes del mejor modo posible. Las cartas en referencia a esta apelación han sido publicadas en mi último libro, en el cual me esfuerzo de acuerdo con mis mejores habilidades, por daros el alerta y preveniros del mal que tenemos ante nuestra vista. Solamente me resta reproducir verbalmente lo que le manifesté al actual vice-presidente de la organización, al cancelar y a mi secretario ejecutivo, tres meses despues de mi encarcelamiento. Washington" por aquel entonces en viaje por las antillas, hice algunas advertencias y me extendí en detalles y minuciosidades acerca de la concienzuda administración de la organización y de sus corporaciones auxiliares en general. Puse sobre los hombros del actual presidente general interno toda la responsabilidad del movimiento. Le advertí que siguiera al pie de la letra e interpretara el espíritu de la organización. Yo presentaba que aunque sentimentalmente se estaba de acuerdo con los principios, veía con pena que el punto práctico no correspondía a los intereses envueltos y de esa manera íbamos a la bancarrota. Millones de nuestro elemento se interesan por mi libertad, pero varios de los directores de la organización se alegrarían de mi destierro y mi eliminación. Manifesté a dichos señores mis ideas de salvar la organización así como también mis temores si no seguían cooperando honradamente y velaban con celo los intereses envueltos en el gran movimiento. El señor presidente general interno ha fracasado completamente. No se ha dignado consultarme y tenerme al corriente de lo que se hace y nada me ha dicho acerca de la vida de la organización. Muchas decisiones se han tomado en cuenta sin comunicarme nada y resoluciones de vital importancia se han llevado a cabo, estando yo completamente ignorante de ello, no habiéndome dado cuenta ni directa ni indirectamente. El no ha querido seguir mis instrucciones, tal como conviniéramos en la conferencia personal que tuvimos aquí en mi prisión. Esta es la situación. Esperad pues lo que diga el comité investigador.
