LET'S PUT IT OVER

THE VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

THE people have spoken. The representatives of the divisions of the Universal Negro Improvement Association, assembled in extraordinary Convention at Detroit, have upheld the Committee of Presidents. They have ousted from office William Sherrill, Clifford S. Browne and George E. Carter, and have appointed others to fill their places. They have let it be known in unequivocal language that they know no leader but Marcus Garvey and are determined to countenance or support no one who finds himself or herself out of harmony, or disposed to ignore and flout him while a capitalist prison houses him.

To make assurance doubly sure, to guard against a recurrence of the present situation, they have delegated to the Honorable Marcus Garvey the power to name the first Assistant President-General. The services of the Honorable Fred A. Toote as Chairman of the Committee of Presidents have been signalled. Mr. Toote is known far and wide as a dyed-in-the-wool Garveyite. But even he comes to the body as simply a temporary leader, absolutely amenable to the wishes of the Honorable Marcus Garvey.

When a man can command such devotion, can inspire such confidence from his fellowmen as that being constantly manifested toward the Honorable Marcus Garvey, he occupies a unique position. Such an attitude on the part of Negroes marks the dawn of an era, big with tremendous possibilities for the future well-being and ability of the race.

FOR THE GOOD OF THE ASSOCIATION

PARLEY CALLED ON THE WEST INDIES

A GREAT many readers of The Negro World will be interested in the announcement made in London that representatives of Great Britain's West Indian colonies and of British Guiana and British Honduras, are invited to attend a conference in London in May. Closer co-operation is desired by the Imperial Government to meet the menace of American penetration and trade expansion. Experts have discovered that American influences and trade have been gaining much headway in the West Indies and it is necessary that the interests of the Mother Country to offset these, if possible. How this can be done, however, does not appear on the surface, as it is everywhere natural to develop close trade and other relations with those nearest to us.

The United States offers the West Indies trade advantages which they are bound to take advantage of unless the Imperial Government places such restrictions upon them as to hamper or prevent them. This has already been done, to some extent, in the interest of the manufacturers of the home country, by restrictions upon West Indian emigration because of the scarcity of work in the home islands, the purpose being to keep the workers at home, although there is no work for them to do and, although work can be had in other islands not British and in the United States. It is a highly selfish policy, which requires the colonies to sell their raw products to and buy their manufactured products of the home country. Several of the dominions have rebelled against this selfish policy, but the colonies are hardly in a position to rebel.

THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS AND THE PEACE OF THE WORLD

THE peace of the world has been the hope and aspiration of Christian statesmen for more than a hundred years. But it has always eluded them as a mirage does the lone traveler in the desert. It is always possible and always impossible. But the hope and the aspiration remain. Perhaps it is well that they do. Where there is no hope there can be no aspiration, no effort to better conditions, and the drift in that case is always toward confusion and destruction. Lord Tenynson dreamed of "A parliament of man, the Federation of the World," giving expression to the hope that then existed and that had gone before. His thought is not original but he clothed it in pleasing and alluring verse and made it pleasant for all those who love the ways of peace.

The League of Nations, which Woodrow Wilson worked out and which the United States refused to accept, was intended to further the peace of the world, but it did not reckon with the engrained hatreds of races and nations which have made Europe a hotbed of war before and during the Christian era. The disposition to war was rather stimulated by the creation of many new States and the resurrection of many old ones, thus making misunderstandings and intrigues more possible and on a larger scale than existed before the World War. The League of Nations has had a comparatively smooth time of it because it has not undertaken to do anything which radically conflicted with the average purposes of its members.

When the Locarno treaties were announced several weeks ago the whole world rejoiced, because it imagined that the peace program had gained a substantial advantage. At the Geneva meeting last week the League decried the Locarno program of refusing to start to admit Germany to membership and no other nation at the same time. Brazil protected and refused to back down, and so the League adjourned all of its Locarno and business affairs for the September meeting, by which time it is hoped to iron out the tangle. Sir Austen Chamberlain, the British secretary for foreign affairs, styled the failure of the meeting over the question of seating applicant nations as a "tragedy."

It developed that the Locarno treaties were reached in secret negotiations, which were brought out in the Geneva meeting, especially with reference to the seating of States other than Germany, and caused the failure of the entire program and the first flat failure of the League to function.

Napoleon is credited with once declaring that victory is usually on the side of the biggest battalions. This is not always true, but it is mostly, not only in peace but in war, if we should substitute "strongest" for "biggest." Until such time as a plan shall be devised by which the fifty-one member nations of the League can have an equal vote, and the majority vote shall count, a combination of the great powers will always be able to have its way, as in the old diplomacy. And the old way is the one to be got rid of.

We once hoped that the League of Nations would be of advantage to formerly groups and to off-color peoples, who are conquered and ruled without their consent by one or other of the big powers, but that hope has not been realized and we much doubt now that it will ever be. The oppressed peoples of Asia and Africa, it appears, have little to hope from the workings of the League of Nations, and the League itself appears to have fallen down in the great work set before it and may not be able to recover from its first flat failure. The people of Asia and Africa have been told in plain terms that if they are to get any relief for their sorrows they must fight for it. The fight to free Africa must go on, therefore, from within and from without, or all will be lost.

THE POOR WHITE SLAVES OF SOUTH AFRICA

WE have been much amazed by a cablegram from Cape Town, South Africa, in which Premier Hertzog of the Union of South Africa, is quoted as saying: "The blacks of South Africa are protected by law against oppression by the whites, and it is our purpose to protect the whites from oppression by the blacks." The premier was explaining the "Color Bar bill," which has made the race question a live issue in South Africa. The bill would reserve all skilled trade work to the white laborer, such as handling and working mining machinery. The Dutch Nationalist and labor parties appear to be behind the Hertzog program, and the bill is being urged primarily by the white workmen. It makes a very ugly issue and if the Hertzog program should prevail would work great hardship on the Negro workers.

Former Premier Jan Christian Smuts is opposed to the Hertzog policies and protests against the proposed labor legislation "on the ground of unfair discrimination against the Negro." He especially demands that the provisions of the bill shall not extend to the Cape Province, "where the blacks, who have long enjoyed the franchise, and has considerable influence, are up in arms against it." General Smuts further declares that "We are throwing a firebrand into a haystack." Premier Hertzog retorts that the firebrand has already been thrown into the haystack, and recalled the many race outbreaks which have occurred of recent date.

It is great gain to the cause of the native blacks that General Smuts has taken sides against Premier Hertzog. He is a very great man, and was one of those who helped President Wilson to shape the League of Nations scheme. As premier he is not pronouncedly favorable to a policy of fair play for the natives. He is out of office now and wants to get back in, and the shortest way is to antagonize the policies of the premier who has the job.

But the most encouraging thing about the South African situation is the open and courageous and intelligent contention the Negroes are making through their own organizations and leadership. That is the sort of a thing that counts and which commands the respect of friends and enemies alike. If one has not the nerve and intelligence to make an effort to help himself others will not be disposed to help him. And herein is the strength of Marcus Garvey and the Universal Negro Improvement Association. They believe and teach that the Negro should rely upon and help himself as a first principle. So he must.

Swarajists Walk Out as Protest Against British

DELHI, India, March 23.—Crowds which thronged the galleries of the Legislative Assembly in anticipation of a lively discussion on the budget grants witnessed a dramatic scene yesterday when the Swarajists, led by Mahatma Gandhi, walked out of the body. They quit the House after an impassioned speech by Mahatma Gandhi, who declared that the co-operation of the Swarajists had been declined and that they had been ridiculed and humiliated. Later the Swarajists sent a message to the people of the United Kingdom protesting against the present system of government was changed. What We Escaped In Not Joining The League

From the New York Telegram: The League of Nations which the United States refused to join in 1919-1920 was a league of the sort established by Mr. Wilson in his famous conference with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. The latter was not allowed to assume the initiative in the settlement of major international disputes. It bled itself with medical and social co-operative movements, acted as the agent of the Powers in the imperative rehabilitation of Austria-Hungary, served as arbitrator in one or two lesser boundary disputes, etc. Its life has been rather peaceful hitherto and its best friends become more encouraged than discouraged by the fact that the League was proving the need for a new international organization.

African Without a Country

To the Editor of The Negro World: A very strange happening was brought to my notice a few days ago. A man was sent to me from Camaguey with a letter and other documents. This man is an African, belonging to Nigeria. His African name is Udember Ozurwu; his English name is Benjamin Christian Davis. And this is his story: He carries on him a British passport with his photograph and also other British documents. He left Nigeria, Africa, on one of the Elder Dempster steamships as a seaman, running between Nigeria, Africa, and South America. He landed in Saint James, Cuba, one evening and he along with an Englishman went in the town for a stroll and slept in town. On their return next morning at 6 o'clock they were told that the ship had left about 8 o'clock. He, along with the white man, took the train to Havana and reported

themselves and their condition to the British minister, who, without delay, made arrangements for the white man to return to England, but told this African young man that he could not do anything for him. He knocked around Havana until he got a chance to stay aboard an American ship, but when he arrived at an American port he was detected and was locked up, but after the authorities examined his passport and other documents they thought the best thing to do was to send him to England, where he would be cared for. But what happened? As soon as the good ship hits the dock there was four soldiers ready armed to march him off to prison and he was made to understand that England is not the place for the black man, and there he was kept until they got a chance to send him back to Cuba, where he had only spent an hour or night, and was told in plain language that the English or British flag is not for him, nor was it intended for the black man, in spite of the fact that England has a protectorate over Nigeria and other Negro countries. Now, Mr. Editor, the thing is this: The Englishman is making it felt, seen and understood that the Negro must either do or die now. It is being said that the Hon. Marcus Garvey is to be deported from the United States of America. Now, my question is, where will the government of America deport the Hon. Garvey to? For if the African horn Negro can't be sent back to his motherland, Africa, where will the Jamaican African be sent? Mr. Editor, I want to ask those black white men in Jamaica where I know so many of them, who are always talking about going to the mother country (England) to spend their vacation, how do they feel now when they read that there is no difference with them today in England, than there was with the German during 1914 and 1917? Will the Albigers remove such Negroes quickly from out of this struggling race of ours so that we may be able to stand and look the world in the face with a united front, marching on to liberty or death. Can Science Save Us From Food Shortage?

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 24 (A. P.).—The world must turn to science in its search for food, said Dr. Samuel C. Prescott in a lecture here today. Dr. Prescott, head of the department of biology at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, said that unless new sources and more efficient methods of production and preservation were found or some method devised to synthesize foods from abundant cheap materials, the world would face a food shortage in the next century. He predicted that the first great trenchment in the world's food supply would come in meat, and that the present generation might live to see a great proportion of its meat coming from the Arctic region, and from tropical countries, where goats and some type of cattle can be raised in large numbers. Soy beans, peanuts and bananas may come to rank among the most important foods, consumption of fish will increase tremendously, and corn will be used more generally as human food. Land now used for cattle raising will be given over to intensive agriculture purposes.

SOUTH AFRICA CURBING THE NEGRO

Premier Hertzog Pushing Bill to Bar Them from the Skilled Trades—General Smuts Fighting for the Negroes

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, (United Press).—"The blacks of South Africa are protected by law against oppression by the whites," said General Hertzog, premier of South Africa, in an exclusive interview granted the United Press, "and it is our purpose to protect the whites against oppression by the blacks." Thus the fiery head of the government, who was elected in opposition to the famous General Jan Smuts, explained the government's "Color Bar Bill," which has made the race question a hot issue here. The bill would reserve to the whites employment in the "skilled trades," chiefly mining and work around machinery. Hertzog, who holds office by virtue of a combination of Dutch Nationalists and organized labor, is pressing the bill largely at the instance of labor. Smuts Makes Protest General Smuts, on the other hand, protests against such legislation on the ground of unfair discrimination against the Negroes. He especially demands that the Cape Province, where the blacks, who have long enjoyed the franchise and have considerable political influence, are up in arms against it. There is also much hostile agitation in Natal. "General Smuts complains that we are throwing a firebrand into a haystack," continued the Premier, "but as he very well knows, the haystack has long been on fire, as race conflicts at Bullhook, Port Elizabeth and Bloemfontein in the last few years testify. We hope that the new bill, giving the whites the protection they need, will reduce the area of disorder. "Our statute books are fairly teeming with laws protecting the natives from encroachments by the white man. If it had not been for these laws, the blacks would never have been able to hold their own against the whites. "I do not see how it can be claimed that the Negro has a 'fundamental' or so-called 'natural' right to employment in mines and around machinery. If he has, then the white man has equally a 'fundamental right'—now denied him—to get the natives' land. The native can't have it both ways. "I would remind our objectors of the Biblical injunction, 'Thou shalt not have two measures, great and small.' Special protection for the blacks, in their own fields, is our justification for extending similar protection to the whites in their fields. "We merely propose to extend to the white race at least some of the protection already accorded to the natives."

Snowbanks Save 19 Radio Fans in Falls

According to statistics nineteen men in Maine have fallen off houses when the falling radio acts this winter and had deep in snowbanks, preventing "what might otherwise have been a serious accident."

Motors to Carry Scientists Over Gobi

Motor cars again will be a factor in the search for traces of primitive man in the Gobi Desert of Mongolia, a quest on which scientists of the American Museum of Natural History are about to embark for the fourth successive season. Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews, head of the expeditions, said before leaving New York to take ship at Victoria, B. C., March 6 for China that this summer he and his party will penetrate to hitherto unexplored parts of the Gobi Desert and that the invasion would be "more dangerous and spectacular than any heretofore attempted." The party again will make use of Dodge Brothers cars as a means of transportation. The fleet will comprise four cars used last summer and left in Peking upon the return from the desert and five new cars which were shipped several weeks ago to Peking, where the expedition will start about April 15. The expedition, which will consist of forty men, will operate from a central depot established 750 miles out in the desert. A big camel train bearing scientific instruments, food, gasoline and oil already is on its way to this depot. It will take the camel train six weeks to make the journey, which will be covered later by the motor cars in four or five days.

Forty-one years ago a young evangelistic preacher was conducting open air service in the village square at Westwood, Mass., says the Boston Globe. His audience was an attentive one, and yet the preacher was troubled, for there was borne home to him the feeling that the youth of the day were slipping away from the influence of the church and that some steps must be taken to save them. Ufford returned to his humble parsonage and in less than half an hour composed the four stanzas of the immortal hymn, "Throw Out the Life Line." In his evangelistic work and while singing his hymn Mr. Ufford made effective use of the two United States Government Life lines which were presented to him by the life saving stations at Cape Cod and Nantucket. They had been used in the rescue of twenty-three sailors from shipwrecked vessels. Mr. Ufford also carried other paraphernalia appertaining to maritime work.
