Fellow-Men of the Negro Race, Greeting:

It pleases me to bring to you another message to cheer and to encourage you in the midst of the splendid fight you are making to preserve intact our great organization and to slowly but surely continue to advance the great program of Afric redemption. It is very difficult for those who have not joined the Universal Negro Improvement Association to understand the spirit of dogged determination which enables this greatest of Negro organizations to emerge triumphant from every situation, no matter how trying it may be. The Universal Negro Improvement Association created the New Negro, and the obstacles which have been hurled in our path of progress have put this creation to the acid test.

The New Negro is a problem to those who do not understand him. They do not know what to do with him. But he knows what to do with himself. He is going to blast his way to complete independence and nationhood. There is no such thing as turning back now. There is nothing to do but go forward—fighting every step of the way if need be, but never surrendering.

We Must Organize to Live

We are not going to fight and kill anybody because he has more than we have. But if there is anybody taking advantage of the Negro, whether he be white, red or blue, we are going to organize to stop him. We believe that white men have as much right to live as yellow men; we believe that yellow men have as much right to live as red men; we believe red men have as much right to live as black men, and we believe that black men have as much right to live as all men. Therefore, if any race of mankind says that the other race must die, it is time for that race that is dying to organize to prevent themselves from dying. And as for me, the sweetest life in the world to me is the life of my race. I cannot change my race overnight. You cannot change your race overnight. We have not been able to change our race for three hundred years. No one can change our race overnight. God created us what we are, and we are going to remain what we are until Gabriel blows his horn.

Our Victory Is Assured

We are of the Negro race and we are suffering simply because we are of the Negro race, and, since we are four hundred million strong, it is for us to organize that strong to protect our race. And I want young men, middle-aged men and old men (and women) of the race also to realize that this is the age of action—action on the part of each and every individual of every race. If there is a white man who does not love the white race, to his race he is an outcast; if there is a yellow man that does not love his race, to the yellow race he is an outcast; if there is a Negro who does not love the black race, to his race such a Negro should become an outcast.

The world in which we live is today more serious than ever it was. White and yellow men have become more selfish today than they were before causing the terrible war, the terrible conflict, of 1914 to 1918. They destroyed all that they spent years and years to build, and all the time and energy they gave is counted for nought because of the destruction. They have, therefore, lost their sympathies for other men. They have lost their sympathies for other races and have settled down to see nothing else but their own interest until they will have succeeded in rebuilding themselves. During this selfish, soulless age it falls to the province of the Negro to take the initiative and do for himself; otherwise he is going to die.

There is an endless chain of Negroes all over the world, and wherever Negroes are to be found this day they are suffering from the brutality of the white man, and because Negroes are suffering all over the world we feel that the time has come for the four hundred millions of us scattered all over the world to link up our sentiment for one common purpose—to obtain liberty and democracy. You have an association that is one of the greatest movements in the world. The New Negro, backed by the Universal Negro Improvement Association, is determined to restore Africa to the world, and you scattered children of Africa, you children of Ethiopia, I want you to realize that the call is now made to you. What are you going to do? Are you going to remain indifferent to your fate, and die? Or are you going to link up your strength, morally and financially, with the other Negroes of the world and let us all fight one battle unto victory?

The future of the race rests in our hands. Let us not be found wanting. Let those who have caught the vision labor night and day to enlighten and inspire those who are lagging behind. Work without ceasing. We are bound to win.

DEFEAT OF MOROCCANS IN FIGHT FOR FREEDOM NEAR

Riffian Capital Captured by French Forces—Abd-el-Krim Taken, Says Tangier Rumor—Tribes Reported to Be Yielding as They Realize the End is Near

PARIS, May 28.—Tangier was captured today by French forces and the Riffian capital, the first phase of the operations of the Taza army is completed, except for a meticulous curbing of the surrounding countryside in search of weapons and the rapid completion of the lines of communication with the base.

The country of several important tribes southwest of Tangier and northeast of the Rif mountains was captured by the French army yesterday and these tribes are awaiting only the arrival of the French columns to make peace and deliver up their arms to the conquerors.

Such operations will take several days, because the Moroccan mind insists upon such procedure and not a single tribeman would think that peace had come until the victors paraded through their principal market places. The French are now preparing a number of promissories to give military honors to the Beni Bechir and the Ouled Bou Slama and will attend the sacrificial offerings with which the Moroccans replace the pipe of peace.

Such a statement was made by the French in only relative, because, as every tribe is conquered, a certain number of the tribes are being used for protection against the raiders.

Even the regions north of Tangier, have a way announcing their intention to make peace as soon as the French reach their territory and the Beni Bechir and the Ouled Bou Slama will attend the sacrificial offerings with which the Moroccans replace the pipe of peace.

HAMPTON WINS INTERCOLLEGE TRACK MEET

Nine Records Shattered at Meet Voted Most Successful Held Since Inauguration in 1922

By THOMAS W. YOUNG HAMPTON, Va., May 24.—Hampton Institute's track squad won the fifth inter-collegiate track and field meet on Armstrong Field last Saturday, piling up 87 points against 25 for her nearest rival, Union University, in a remarkable event where nine records were broken.

The thermometer registered ideal track weather but before the meet was over rain interrupted its program. John Carroll, reputable Baltimore distance runner, was leading the field in a special scholastic two-mile run, and DeHart Hubbard, holder of the world's broad jump record and several other titles, had just completed his first sensational jump when everybody was driven to shelter.

Records Shattered. Nine record-breaking events followed each other in rapid succession. Pierce of St. Paul began the crusade by beating his own last year's shot put record with a heave of 38 feet, 3 inches. Wm. D. Williams of Hampton knocked off a tenth of a second from his 1924 time by making the 120-yard high hurdles in 16.7 seconds. Edward Taylor of Hampton bested Hargrove's javelin distance by three feet, throwing 160 feet 9 inches. Manassas's quartet lowered Union Street's Virginia relay time of 3 minutes 46.4 seconds by winning the event in 3 minutes 40.6 seconds.

Coles and Cook Break a Pair Each. Robert A. Coles, for two years captain of Hampton's track squad, and W. Cook of Union, each shattered two records. Coles began his race with the determination to break a record and, after leading practically the entire distance and almost lapping the trailer, he broke the tape in 4 minutes 29.7 seconds. Nichols of Howard had the best time—held since 1923—until Saturday. Not satisfied, Coles began the two-mile run with the same

record-smashing air, and after leading the entire route he crossed the line in 10 minutes, 26.1 seconds, lowering his own time of 1924 by ten seconds. In both of these races George Merritt of Hampton reared a cheer from the stands by forging ahead from the rear and sprinting past his competitors on the home stretch to finish second to his victorious teammate. Cook, Union's flash for five years, in company with DeHart Hubbard, pulled down by 2-10 second the record he established in 1922, the same being equaled by Byrd of Lincoln in 1923, and accomplished the century in 10 seconds' flat. Cook also added to his laurels in the 440-yard dash by clipping from Langston's record made in 1924—21.4 seconds—and won the Chicago Defender trophy in 50.4 seconds. Joseph Baldwin of Hampton, after getting off on a bad start, pulled ahead of Banks of St. Paul, and made a daring, though unsuccessful, attempt to overtake Cook's big lead.

Hampton Again Takes Relay. With one leg on the Madame Walker trophy which goes to the school winning it three times, Hampton's mile relay team paced away from all competitors for a second share on the beautiful cup. Union was given the advantage in the first lap. Cook, the master of the quarter, bested George Gray, Hampton's lead-off man by a few yards, but King changed Gray's second into a long lead for first place in the next line. Hampton's third runner, Clarke, maintained his lead and added a few yards to it. So when Joseph Baldwin, final runner for the blue and white, began his quarter, he had only to protect his lead. This he did admirably against the dangerous threats of several other survivors who also sought a claim to the coveted trophy. Hampton's time was 3 minutes, 32.1 seconds.

This event closed the most successful meet held at Hampton since the annual classic was inaugurated in 1922. Nearly 200 athletes representing 20 institutions competed for the cups and medals which represent the high school achievement in organized athletic Negro athletics. While no entries were received for the new events introduced in the meet this year, the pentathlon, the medley, and two-mile relays, it is hoped and believed that interest in these contests will grow to the extent of that manifested in the other numbers on the program. However, these features were initiated Saturday with intramural competition.

Despite Hampton's apparent monopoly on places—10 firsts, 11 seconds and 4 thirds out of 14 events—the meet was no walk-away for the home lads. They were pushed to the limit of their well-earned and fully deserved places in every event. Not the decline of invading competition but the high school achievement in organized athletic Negro athletics.
