Women Consistent, Fair and True Among those whom I can recommend as being most honorable and consistent leaders of the movement are two women who have done exceedingly well, when nearly all the men have failed, and they are still in active service—Madame M. L. T. DeMena, who is our present international organizer, and Lady Henrietta Vinton Davis, who is our present secretary general. We have had very little trouble with the women in the movement; with the exception of one or two, we have never had a dishonest woman in the leadership of the organization. Every woman has played fair and true.

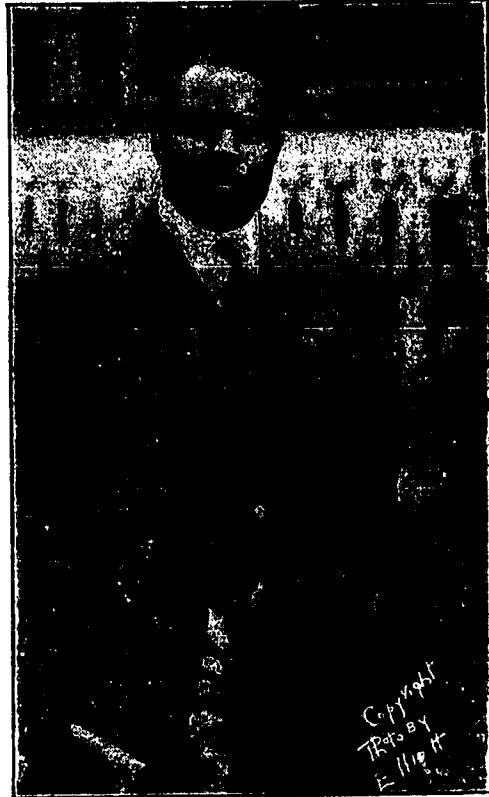
Men Have Abused Confidence But it is sad to say, that nearly every man we placed in position of trust has abused that confidence and proven a scamp. They always see the selfish "I," the desire to exploit the people willing to support the cause, for their own purpose. That is the great difficulty with Negro organizations and the great difficulty that the Universal Negro Improvement Association has not been able to overcome entirely.

A Traitor Vice-President I make bold to make these statements of truth because I want to guide my people right. Everybody who has watched Negro movements knows that sooner or later most of them get founded on the same rock—inconsistency, dishonesty, swill-headedness, and the desire to usurp authority—everybody wanting to be boss, wanting to be head.

But U. N. I. A. Will Move On These are the things that ruin Negro movements, but still, because of the deep-seated principles of the Universal Negro Improvement Association and its glorious ideals, the movement moves on, overcoming all difficulties, destroying all handicaps. And so today the movement is entrenched in the hearts of hundreds of millions of Negroes throughout the world. We have done wonderful work in Africa. And if our work in the 10 years was to be measured by profits and dividends, we could fairly say that the Universal Improvement Association has been the most successful movement not only among Negroes but among all races during that period of time.

Have Done Best for Race

Short-sighted men, self-seeking men in America and also in the West Indies are constantly violating the trust of the Negro masses. My name has been used as a kind of character's cheque for certain people. But with all that has happened, I can honestly say I have done my best for my race; and God has so blessed us that the Universal Negro Improvement Association has survived. We have not only made our impress on the nations, but have attracted the attention of the League of Nations, and today many things that are working for the good of the Negro in



Africa are because of our determination to press our cause before the League.

To Continue Industrial Program There is nothing like proper education. It will fit the man for his future. And so the education in the Universal Negro Improvement Association's propaganda has done such great work that today many a Negro owes his position to this source.

We are now launching out in America, in keeping with our original objects, on the proposition of building factories in the United States and developing plantations in the West Indies and in Africa. This is going to take a tremendous outlay of money and cooperation, but we are laying a proper foundation. With the plan we have in view, we hope that in 10 years the Negro will be on the right road to the solution of his problems.

We are anticipating opposition from the same group of men, who do nothing but oppose. They have not up to now brought out any economic solution of our race problem. Yet, they agitate to oppose anything undertaken by others for the good of the race. We must realize that our greatest

E. B. Knox, who broke on Saturday, May 24, into the headquarters of the Garvey Club Inc., at 855 Lenox avenue and tried to rifle the records and subscribers' list of the Negro World, was brought before the Fifth District Magistrate's Court, 370 East 121st St., New York City, before Justice E. Weil for trial.

Higher Bail Asked For Mr. Knox appeared before the court greatly worn out and with fear in his eyes. His lawyer's motion for postponement was not contested as such by the counsel for The Negro World, but the latter argued that the defendant should be held on a bail bond much higher than \$1,500, of which \$1,000 was for possession of a gun without license, and \$500 for assault.

Moro Outlaws Repel Constabulary Attack

TROOP WITHDRAW AFTER FIRING INTO OLD MINDANAO FORT MANILLA, May 28.—Moro outlaws fought off another attack by a Philippine constabulary detachment which fired 300 shells from a mortar gun in a bombardment of an old fort in a Lanao Province, Mindanao Island, in which the tribesmen are entrenched.

Troops Withdraw After Firing Into Old Mindanao Fort

At sunset the insular troops retired for the night, fearing ambush in the dense woods of the region. One soldier was wounded. The casualties among the Moros, if any, were not determined.

Use of Rifles, Shotguns and Large Pistols

Used by the defenders kept up a steady fire on the constabulary. Colonel L. R. Stevens, the district commander, kept his men under cover as much as possible and refused to permit a rush on the fort, desiring to avoid such casualties as were inflicted by the Moros on May 7, when four soldiers were killed and ten wounded.

This paper was awarded a prize of \$100 in national high school contest conducted by the Commission on Interracial Cooperation, of the Atlanta, Ga. It was one of several thousand papers written by students on this subject—Editor.

The human ingredients of this huge melting pot of ours have always been a source of keen interest to the student of humanity. To carefully analyze personalities, finally labeling and classifying them as representatives of their countrymen, has ever been the delight of psychologists. Of late America, we find signs of it being placed on a lower shelf because his skin is darker than that of others, or it is merely a social aversion for close association with a "black man" that limits his progress? Let us see what we can find out.

Negro Is an Honorable Name

Lo! They took the name and planted it out of its lowly setting, and lifted it high upon the solid rock of achievement. By their deeds they secured power and compensation, and raised their names to the level of respect those whom they identified. Their detractors soon discovered that the word "Negro" was eminently correct when he said, "A rose by any other name is just as sweet."

Proposal of Quota Pleasing to Japan

Manila Says Amendment of Our Law Would Improve Relations Greatly

TOKYO, May 24.—News of the immigration ordinance, now submitted to the Japanese Cabinet by Representative Albert Johnson of an amendment to the Immigration Act of 1924, which would place a quota on the number of immigrants from other nations was welcomed by former Ambassador Hanabusa. He said that such a measure would improve relations between the United States and Japan.

In an interview with our correspondent today, Mr. Hanabusa said he was very much satisfied with the plan of Representative Johnson. "What is most important, if the plan is acted upon," he said, "is that it will remove the discrimination which has existed against Japan. It is not so much a question of how many emigrants we send to the United States, but of the fact that we send our emigrants there if they are not wanted; but we do not want to see the rights of American citizens in Japan altered."

love the man who is courageous, the man who will not back down because of his color or race. I have never taken off my hat to a white man in the South. Fight, fight, fight for the life that God has given to you, to live as you see fit.

Pleading further for help for members of the race who might migrate here the senior bishop declared: "I have never boasted of having much religion; in fact, I haven't. It is much, but what little I have, it is enough to prevent me from sending away any one hungry or in need of clothes or help while I have plenty. Get that kind of religion, so you will help less fortunate members of your people."

"It haunts me," declared Bishop Jones, "to have plenty to eat and know that some one is hungry."

Big Words Culture

"Some people join the church for social reasons," the bishop said. "It is not of that kind. Christianity means to help and I want you to be that kind of a Christian."

He was harsh in his criticism of men and women who attempt to display an air of culture by using big words.

"Never use them," he said. "Real cultural people avoid them as much as possible, instead of using them. You should have big ideas, depend upon your ideas to display any culture you might have."

The bishop dwelt at length on three different fundamentals of Christianity found today: "What is mine, is mine; what is yours, is yours; but the real Christian will say, 'What is mine is yours, I will divide, and what is yours is yours, to do as you please."

"What is mine is mine, is not the philosophy I believe in," the bishop declared.

Snobbery of Society

Speaking of social life, he said: "I do not care a snap of my finger for it. I am invited to more dinners than I can attend, but that is the snobbery of society to give to those who are able to provide for themselves."

"Many so-called Christians are found occupying the amen seats in our churches today who are society snobs. You must avoid them and try to help the less fortunate members of your race. Until you do so we can never hope to succeed in life and make the demands that other races make."

Break Party Ties

In an interview after the sermon in which a reporter asked his views on prohibition, the bishop said that he was in favor of the present law, because our group are the worst sufferers.

To another question by another reporter on his views of whom the race should support in politics, he declared that party ties should be broken.

"Vote for and support the man who will act kindly to the race, men who will display a Christian attitude toward you and your people," he concluded.

Tagore Sees India Rift As Man vs. Machine

(Special Cable to New York Times)

LONDON, May 24.—The present conflict in India is a struggle between man and machine, in the opinion of Rabindranath Tagore, Indian poet and mystic, who is now in England.

Mr. Tagore, who has many friends here and who has been knighted by the King, has harsh things to say of the spirit of the British administration in India. He is sympathetic to Mahatma Gandhi's campaign and believes the eventual triumph of the Nationalists is certain.

"India is being ruled by a complicated machine," the aged poet said in speaking today at the yearly meeting of the Society of Friends. "The mechanics who drive it have had long training in power, which is superfluous in a workshop. They are incapable of understanding the living India, owing to the natural mentality of a bureaucracy which simplifies its task and manages an alien race from a distance through various switches, handles and wheels, and hardly ever through the human touch."

"It produces perfect results as long as the subject race meekly behaves like dead material, yielding to machine-made law and order, offering no resistance when exploited."

Mr. Tagore said he was firmly convinced that the "great British people" were not behind the present conflict.

"Let the best minds of the East and the West join hands to establish a truly human bond of interdependence between England and India, wherein their interests may never clash, and they may gain an abiding sense of life through a spirit of mutual service," he concluded.

is the oldest continuously dry land on the face of the earth. Because it remained above the waters while the land masses of Europe and America were periodically rising and falling.

The expedition will also make further explorations in the area where in 1928 were found remains of the "dune dwellers," a race of people who lived in the stone age.

Dr. Andrews discovered flint instruments and other evidence indicating that there were millions of the "dune dwellers," and that the region was populated much more densely than in historical times. This race of people has disappeared.

Two Chinese scientists, W. C. Pei of the Chinese Geological Survey, and Dr. H. C. Chang of the Canton University will accompany Dr. Andrews and five Americans. Dr. Chang was educated in Vienna and Munich. Mr. Pei made the actual discovery of the skull of the "Feking woman" thirty miles from Paiping.

5 Towns Are Inundated, 4,000 Homeless in Flood

SHREVEPORT, La., May 24.—With five towns partly under water and more than 4,000 persons homeless, a serious flood condition prevailed tonight in several sections of Louisiana. Only one death, that of William Lafin, of Grant Parish, who was drowned in the Red River, has been reported.

Thousands of refugees are being cared for in emergency camps. Food and clothing are scarce throughout the stricken area.

"The condition is more grave than in 1927," State Representative James Aswell said tonight. "Relief funds are needed."

Five villages, West Dale, East Point, Crichton, Armeted and Abington, are inundated. Residents have been forced to flee from their homes.

the past; sugar cane is a profitable endeavor. Nothing but disaster staring our laborers in their faces. At the same time the prices of foodstuffs and the daily necessities of life are at a price above the earnings of the average laborer. What is he to do?

We hear talked stories of the wealth of Honduras and Costa Rica, and the happy condition of their populations and the general wealth and prosperity of their people. We know that this is superficial. It presents a false-looking appearance from the outside but go down deep into their economic structure and you will find that there are certain weaknesses there that we do not have in Nicaragua. Our native land is yet to be developed; this should be an incentive to our leaders. We can at least legislate to a greater extent with freedom than most of our other sister states. We do not want to be the policies of Nicaragua completely adapted by foreign capitalists, as in this respect we would lose our nationalistic traits. We have always insisted that foreign capital must go half way with our governments and people.

What can be done to alleviate this serious economic strain through which we are passing? We have always held up to our people the splendid opportunities offered in the field of agriculture. Hence lies the future of this coast. Most natives possess lands on the river. Why not begin to cultivate? It would be the greatest step in the direction of independence for our people who have had to labor under all sorts of disadvantages. Besides, farming is no disgrace. It is an honorable pursuit. It would in a sense unite our people by bringing them together at agricultural exhibits to show what they have done to improve their lands and produce.

Aside from agriculture as a means of lessening the existing pressure of labor evils we suggest the following: That the work on the Tipitapa-Rama highway be started at both ends. This would certainly give the people on the coast an opportunity to engage in some phase of work until they can begin to adjust matters for themselves. We hope that this suggestion will not pass by unheeded.

Despite all the present gloom there is no need for more pessimism on the matter. The hope of our country and people lies right in the soil under our very feet. There is no need for our people to be in the condition that they are today. They have rejected the sugar trust for other pursuits that have brought them rich returns. We answer to all our labor difficulties in the development of agriculture. Intensive farming will solve Nicaragua's internal difficulties. Bear in mind that a **NATION OF FARMERS IS ALWAYS INDEPENDENT**.

86 Dead, 1,000 Hurt In India Revolution

BOMBAY, May 28.—A decision of Congress leaders to defy British authority by raising a Nationalist flag at Sholapur and reports of additional casualties in outlying districts indicated today the serious undercurrent of India's independence movement.

A check of casualties in three days of rioting this week revealed a total of eighty-six dead and close to 1,000 injured.

Latest reports of violence were from Lucknow, where a mob attacked police and set fire to a police shelter, forcing the officers to fire fifty-seven shots. At last four natives were killed and thirty natives and fourteen police injured.

Bombay Remains Quiet

Despite the quiet in Bombay today, there was some nervousness on the part of the European population that the feelings of natives against foreigners had been inflamed to a dangerous point.

The Mohammedan attack on a physician's son as he was motoring through the city Monday night, and other isolated incidents of natives forcing Europeans to remove their hats, which were burned, were regarded as indications that the feeling against Europeans was more intense than at any other time since the rebellion started.

Mohammedans Now Aroused

Pervious to the rioting of yesterday and Monday, the Mohammedans had been regarded as passively opposed to the independence movement, which they claimed to feel was directed chiefly towards setting up a Hindu-controlled government unfavorable to Mohammedans. That unexpected and violent outburst, therefore, added to the apprehension.

Rioting between dock strikers and strike breakers continued today at Raangoon, although numerous bodies of armed forces occupied the city. They included the Cameron Highlanders and a Punjab Regiment, as well as the military police and the civil police. In addition, European residents were enrolled to fight the riot.

Women Picked for Fight

LONDON, May 28.—(AP)—The news from India today showed that a new form of civil resistance was taking place in Calcutta.

Women pickets gathered on the main grounds where league football matches were to be played and by obstructing the entrances to pavilions, prevented the players from entering or emerging and thus stopped all play.

Karachi was another news center. The police there raided a shop which had been selling nationalist and anti-English goods and seized a large quantity of the goods.

the task of assisting in the investigation.

Twice reported dead from his wounds, the Negro clung tenaciously to life. The first report came when it was learned he was wounded; the second when, wrapped in a blanket, he was carried through a crowd that officers believed still possessed the potentialities of a mob. He was loaded into an ambulance and rushed to the University of Oklahoma Hospital at Oklahoma City. He died about an hour after arrival there.

With Skinner as a leader the mob assembled early last night after Argo had been arrested and identified by Mrs. Skinner as the man who she said had attacked her in their little dugout home a mile from Chickasha.

Deputy sheriffs repulsed the first advances on the jail. As the mob grew more menacing local National Guardsmen were ordered out by Charles F. Barrett, Oklahoma Adjutant General.

Using battering rams and sledge hammers, about 100 men crashed in the steel door of the jail just as the National Guardsmen arrived in a truck, clearing a path with high-aimed machine-gun volleys.

Rifles cut light and telephone wires, fusing brickbats, fired the National Guard truck in front of the building and at least a dozen times attempted to set fire to the jail.

Bolder men advanced to the door of the cell in which the Negro was confined and attacked the walls, seeking to make an opening through which they could extricate their intended victim. Argo fought back with desperation, hurling whatever missiles reached his hands. Finally he wrenched an iron bar from one of the attackers and flailed about with it.

Rioters, seeking club and levers, tore water pipes from the interior of the jail, looting a flood to add to the confusion. Officers believed the Negro was shot during this stage, probably by some one who climbed the ivy-covered walls outside and fired into the cell.

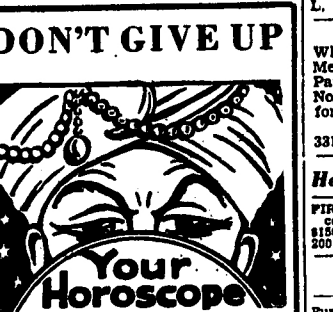
