Negroes Must Stop Fighting, Obstructing Each Other

De Priest Re-elected; Harlem Elects Two Judges, One to State Assembly; Other States Do Well

Illinois Also Has 5 Assemblymen; Judge George Defeated in Re-election

TWO STATE SENATORS

Justice of Peace in Missouri; Negro Vote Split in Many States

CHICAGO, Ill. Congressman De Priest successfully withstood the tide of Democratic votes in Cook County, Illinois, and was re-elected to Congress.

Judge George Defeated
Judge Albert B. George was defeated in his race to be re-elected one of the twelve municipal judges of the city.

State Senator Adelbert H. Roberts was re-elected and all the colored representatives in the Illinois state legislature won. They are George W. Blackwell, Harris B. Gaines, William E. King, Charles J. Jenkins and William Warfield. Langston was defeated for county commissioner.

The colored districts ignored the dodgers prepared by Mayor Thompson and went for Mrs. McCormick, who was snored under by J. Hamilton Lewis.

Harlem Results
Harlem marched to the polls here Tuesday in the state election and elected two colored Democrats, James S. Watson and Charles E. Toney to the municipal court bench.

Watson and Toney defeated two colored Republicans, Francis E. Rivers and John Clifford Hawkins. The unofficial figures were Watson, 14,660; Rivers, 11,800; Toney, 11,800; Hawkins, 11,800.

Colds Beat All Illness in Cost

Toll Not Only of Day's Work, but Time, Money, and Future Health

The tremendous economic loss caused by colds was stressed by Commissioner Shirley W. Wynne in his weekly talk over W.E.A.F. "Colds take more dollars and cents out of the worker's pocket in one year than any other sickness," he said. "They are also responsible for a greater loss of time from school and work than any other single cause. I consider the common cold one of the most formidable enemies of the public health, with which the Health Department has to deal."

"Unfortunately, a cold does not stop at stealing one day's work. It often takes a far larger toll of time, money, future health and usefulness. A common cold, neglected, can prepare the way for other and more serious diseases such as pneumonia, bronchitis, heart disease, and tuberculosis. In many cases, the person who has managed to overcome tuberculosis and is leading a healthy life can be so weakened by a cold that his old disease becomes active again. "It is, in fact, these sequelae of colds that cause death. Our vital statistics give no hint of the prevalence and importance of the cold, because there is no actual mortality as the result of colds. But, could the sum total of suffering, inconvenience, the sequelae, the economic loss resulting from common colds be placed before you, you would be appalled at the dreadful reckoning."

Few Exempt from Colds
Commissioner Wynne laid great emphasis on the fact that few people are immune to colds. "It is the commonest and most widespread of the communicable diseases," he said. (Continued on Page Eight)

Haiti House Elects Anti-Occupationist

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, Nov. 11.—Jolibois Filis, avowed anti-occupationist, has been elected President of the Haitian House of Deputies. His election was on the first ballot.

The Haitian Senate has not yet been organized, but met today for settlement of one remaining contested seat. It is likely that a Haitian President will be selected before the next weekend.

Joseph Jolibois Filis is the man re-elected to Haitian Parliament on a Labor ticket. He is president of the National Confederation of Workers and Peasants of Haiti.

Once Boasted Great Wealth and Power; Now Cries for Help

A RACKET OF HATE

Excesses Demoralized the Order, Caused Downfall—Still Strong in Pa.

The gradual decline in power and membership in the Ku Klux Klan is discussed in a report of the order recently made public here. What was considered once as being the world's most highly organized "racket," both politically and financially, is now looked upon as merely a crumbling shell, hastily approaching oblivion. Nevertheless, it is making a last desperate stand to control the ballot box and exact a tribute for political power.

A history of the most infamous organization shows that beginning with its incorporation in 1920, with Atlanta as headquarters, it grew by untold leaps and bounds, reaching the pinnacle of its political and financial power in 1925. According to the records, the membership in 1924 was 8,901,871—comprising chapters in every state in the country and the District of Columbia.

Fabulous Wealth Disappears
Certain members of the old organization seek from time to time to obtain an accounting of its funds. It is a mystery to them what was done with the once fabulous wealth that has been amassed. Thousands of them have never been able to learn from Imperial Wizard Hiram W. Evans. (Continued on Page Eight)

Haiti Hates Russell, Praised by Hoover

President Accepts Resignation of former U. S. Dictator; Replaces Him by a Civilian

MUNRO NEW APPOINTEE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—President Hoover last Wednesday accepted the resignation of Brig. Gen. John H. Russell as American high commissioner to Haiti.

In letters given out at the State Department his services in Haiti were praised by President Hoover and Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson.

Munro to Sall
Gen. Russell will be replaced by a civilian minister, Dana G. Munro, chief of the division of Latin-American affairs in the State Department. Dr. Munro is sailing for his new post on November 11. Gen. Russell will return to duty with the United States Marine Corps. He has been the American high commissioner at Port-au-Prince since 1922. His resignation is effective November 12.

Forbes Commission
The replacement of Gen. Russell, who has been described as "the military ruler of Haiti," by a civilian as the United States minister is in accordance with the recommendations of the Forbes commission which however recommended that this not be done until "the inauguration of a permanent president" of Haiti.

A national assembly has been elected but no Haitian president has yet been named.
Gen. Russell was sent to Haiti in 1922 with the title of "high commissioner and envoy extraordinary and plenipotentiary of the United States to the Republic of Haiti." Opponents of the American occupation charged (Continued on Page Eight)

U. S. Moves to Relinquish Treaty Rights in China

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Submission by the American Government of proposals to the Chinese Government for the gradual relinquishment of American extraterritorial rights in China was announced today by Secretary Stimson.

The proposals are in line with the State Department's policy enunciated last year that the United States was prepared to negotiate on a method for relinquishment of the treaty rights. At that time, the United States said relinquishment would apply to designated territorial areas in China or to particular kinds of jurisdiction, such as civil or criminal rights held under the treaty. Under these rights, Americans are not subject to Chinese courts.

The condition attached by the United States to its policy was that it must proceed along with the enactment and effective enforcement of laws by China "based on modern concepts of jurisprudence."

The proposals of the American Government in the broad sense are based in part on the principal of specified areas. They are similar to but not identical with proposals by the British Government to the Chinese in September. The proposals were communicated to Minister Wu of China here and Foreign Minister C. T. Wang at Nanking.

RABAT, Morocco—Trial marriage, offered as a modern idea a few years ago, is standard practice in many desert tribes.

It is dying out under the French plan of civilization here, or at least the authorities think it is.

Recently, however, a pair which hadn't heard of modern law contracted to live together for a year and a half. Each retained the right to leave at will, carrying off whatever goods were contributed to the household.

RACE WEAKNESS HIT

Day of "Nigger Jobs" Is Gone; Must Develop Labor Consciousness

LYNCHBURG, Va.—Lorenzo I. Greene, research investigator of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, spoke to an audience Tuesday night, at the Court St. Baptist Church, Mr. Greene delivered a timely address on unemployment among Negroes, its cause and its remedies. He portrayed the displacement of race workers on the farms of the south, in hotels, homes and in other fields of employment, such as street cleaning, railroad labor, garbage collecting, and in mechanical work.

Mr. Greene then astounded his listeners by asserting that the Negroes' own unreliability, lack of punctuality, want of training, and their general failure to take care of their jobs have all collaborated to drive him out of his customary employment. The Negro, continued Mr. Greene, must develop a new labor consciousness, in light of this displacement. The day of "nigger" jobs, exclusively set apart for race workers, is gone, never to return. Negroes must become producers instead of consumers, he added, in order to create jobs for their own group, for in times of economic stress such as now faces the nation, they can hardly expect white employers, no matter how kindly disposed, to employ them.

Dr. Haynes Back From So. Africa

Whites and Natives Eager to Know Race's Progress in U. S.

A 10,000 MILE TRIP

"Character, Power of Natives Wonderful"; Western Negro Should Lead

Dr. George E. Haynes, secretary, Commission on Race Relations, returned on the Steamship Olympia, from a survey tour of South and Central Africa, including the Union of South Africa, Southern and Northern Rhodesia, Congo Belge and Portuguese Angola. He made a special study of the Young Men's Christian Association work which has been done during the past ten years by Max Yergan among the native students of the Bantu people of South Africa. He traveled about 10,000 miles, much of it by automobile, in the remotest parts of South Africa, Congo Belge, and Angola. He visited and studied the work of a number of missions of the American Missionary Societies, giving special attention to the question of Negro missionaries and the possibility of their work in Central Africa.

Commenting on the problem of relations between white and Negro peoples in that part of the world, Dr. Haynes said: "There are many phases of the race problem in South and Central Africa such as we know in America, and there are a number of things in the conditions there which are different from ours here. For example, there are many languages which make it difficult for different groups to communicate with each other in the effort to work out their problems. White and black are widely separated." Race Attorney Sits On Bench at Tulsa

Acts as Special Master in Chancery in Suit Involving Church Members

FIRST SO HONORED

TULSA, Okla. Ren C. Franklin, colored attorney, has had a unique honor bestowed on him this week in sitting on the bench in district court here as special master in chancery in a suit involving members of a colored church.

Franklin was named to be the case by Judge Saul Yergan, an agreement of all parties involved. He is the first race man in Oklahoma ever to sit on a district court bench.

He is one of the best known racial attorneys in the city, and frequently appears in the various courts. After hearing evidence in the case for two days, he took the matter under advisement, to rule at a later date. The case was that of a number of former members of the Church of God in Christ, who sought court relief to force Rev. William Strossman, pastor of the church, to admit them to membership, after he had allegedly ousted some 65 of them.

The court action was brought by Frank Fugett and H. G. Brown. They formerly held positions as trustees, but claimed they were ex-communicated when they protested to the pastor regarding his handling of the church's finances.

He had been pictured as a "czar," a "dictator in church affairs" who compares to Mussolini himself, and charged with literally running the church to suit himself. The specific charge brought in the present case is that he has sought to purchase a new site for a church despite the fact that the present one (Continued on Page Eight)

South's Women Hit Lynching

All Good Citizens Called to Help Eradicate Mob Violence

ATLANTA, Ga. Twenty-one women, prominent in the religious, educational and social life of the South, met in Atlanta Saturday, broadcast to the world a repudiation of lynching as "a defense of womanhood," and called upon America to make an end of this crime "which discredits our civilization and our religion around the globe." Eight southern states were represented in the meeting.

"We are convinced that lynching is not a defense of womanhood or of anything else," said the women in their statement, "but rather a menace to private and public safety and a deadly blow at our most sacred institutions." Lynching, according to the group, is not alone the crime of ignorant and irresponsible mobs, but every citizen who condones it, even by his silence, must accept a share of its guilt.

Anti-Mob Crusade Planned

The meeting, called by the Commission on Interracial Cooperation, spent the day planning a sustained southern crusade, through all available agencies, against mob violence. Efforts will be made to enlist the organized bodies of women, religious and civic, and a special appeal will be made to the governors of the various states, in the belief that their influence may be made an effective factor in the prevention of lynching, as has been demonstrated in Alabama, North Carolina and other states.
