Prof. Fred Hall Wins Honors In Degree of Master of Arts and Supervisor of Music

ATLANTA, Ga.—Prof. Fred Hall, director of music of Clark and Morris-Brown Universities and Gammon Theological Seminary, begins the New Year under the favorable auspices of two new degrees—master of arts and supervisor of music. The first was conferred upon him by Columbia University, New York, at the end of an eight months' resident post-graduate course made possible by a fellowship from the Rosenwald Fund. From Columbia Teachers College he received the honorary degree of supervisor of music, the highest degree which that institution confers in the musical field. While taking his post-graduate work Prof. Hall served effectively as organist and chorister of Mount Calvary Methodist Church on 140th Street, New York.

Graduating from Morehouse College in 1921 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Prof. Hall was called to Jackson, Miss., where he became director of music in Jackson College and supervisor of music in the colored city schools. In these positions he served with distinction until 1925, when he came to Atlanta to take charge of the departments of music in Clark and Gammon, later adding the musical directorship at Morris-Brown.

In these years Prof. Hall has attained a wide and enviable reputation as composer, performer, and director of choir and orchestra. He is now working on a series of musical textbooks, in the hope of making an increasing contribution to the teaching of music throughout the South. His master's thesis on "School, Church and Community Music for Negroes in the Rural South," suggests the direction of his major interest. He hopes to study further in Europe, leading to a doctorate in music.

Prof. Hall is one of five children of Mrs. Laura Hall, of this city. Though widowed, Mrs. Hall succeeded in giving good educational advantages to each of her children, three of them having taken college courses and the others having completed high school. One of the daughters is married, two are teaching in the city schools, and the fourth is in business.



Registration of Aliens Urged by State Chamber

A measure for the compulsory registration and finger-printing of all aliens in this country as a means of strengthening deportation laws and ridding the country of criminal aliens has been recommended in a report of the Chamber of Commerce of the State of New York, it was disclosed yesterday.

The report will be acted on at the regular meeting on Thursday. It asserts that because aliens are not registered the detection of person smuggled into this country is seriously hampered, and calls attention to estimates that the number entering in this way is nearly as great as those entering legally.

Italians Repulse Abyssinian Invaders

Tafari's Territory Invaded; 200 Raiders "Annihilated"; Many Small Forts Destroyed

ROME.—A message from Assab, in Eritrea, today said a party of about 200 African tribal raiders had been "annihilated" on the plains of Mogororra in Dankalia district of northeastern Ethiopia. The tribesmen were attacked by a column of native troops serving under the Italian colors. The battle lasted a full day and night. Eight troopers were killed.

The raiding tribesmen had been sending out parties for several months to molest the tribes which were living within the Italian territory of Eritrea, which borders on the Red Sea and also on the northern boundary of Abyssinia or Ethiopia. The message said the raiding tribes had robbed the peaceful residents of the region, stolen their live stock, and imposed levies on them.

The Italian command ordered a column to chase the raiders across the frontier into Abyssinia, which is ruled by the Emperor Haile Selassie I, whose recent coronation attracted diplomatic envoys from the great powers of the world. The troops destroyed a number of forts and small villages before overtaking the raiding ranks. After the battle the Italian forces seized a large quantity of arms, which was sent back to the Italian military depot at Asmara.

Italians Circle Africa

ALGIERS, Algeria.—Three Italian aviators, Lombardi, Mazotti and Rosini, arrived tonight with a record of having flown entirely around the continent of Africa since leaving Rome in October.

The fliers using light planes, touched Tripoli, Cairo and Khartoum, then shot southward to Cape Town. Coming up the west coast, they flew by way of Libreville, Bamako, Dakar and Casablanca. They will return to Rome by way of Tunis.

Harlem Number Game Continues To Flourish Under New System

Despite the fact that the New York Clearing House Association discontinued daily publication of its balances January 1 and thereby threw a mean monkey wrench into Harlem's pet gambling game, numbers, number playing goes merrily on with certain figures of the New York Stock Exchange sales totals substituted for those formerly furnished in the clearing house figures.

The method of determining the winning number is by taking the last two digits in the hundred thousand column and the first digit in the hundred column. For instance, on Wednesday the stock sales totaled 2,140,190 shares and the winning number was 401. Those who bet on that number were paid. The odds remain the same—600 to 1—and bets of any amount from 1 cent up can be placed.

'Green Pastures' Has Baseball Star in Cast

He's making a mighty fine actor, this boy, Jimmy Fuller, who plays Cain, the sixth in "Green Pastures." Before going into this big production Jimmy had played small bits around the Toby circuit with some success but nothing to brag about—except that he possessed a natural heavy voice that threw a scare into his co-workers—besides it was more of a lark for Jimmy, he didn't take his work seriously. As he often told the actors in his careless droll way, "I'm no actor, I'm a ball player, but I'm just holding down this bit because none of you guys can play it." But when Jimmy was cast for "Green Pastures" because of his record of past performances as an actor, he began to take his work just as seriously as he did his fifteen years of professional baseball playing. So now he is clipping records as an actor just as he did all over America and Cuba on the diamond. And there's no maybe about this mervy friend of mine having been one of the greatest receivers, or backstops in the great American pastime.

Started Playing Young

Jimmy is not old now—but he broke into baseball exceptionally young and with more glaring nerve than I've seen exhibited in the usual gang of ball players. In fact, Jimmy was so sure of himself behind the bat as his tender years that he defied the older fellows to catch better than he could. A point that made those old timers sore. It made enemies for the "boy receiver" as they termed him. But then Jimmy was such a shark on catching the great "Griff" McDonald of the Havana Red Sox in 1912-13-14-15 that the public liked him. The old sordid head players, much older than Jimmy, had to call him "good." He was a hitter too, and a fast runner. Some of the teams that he played with and helped make famous because of his great one-hand receiving were Harlem Colored Giants, Pittsburgh Giants, Havana Red Sox, Famous Cuban Giants, Quebec Royals of Montreal, and Chappy Gardner's New York Red Sox of Montreal in 1924. And Jimmy was my captain—and a good one too.

Five Italian Fliers Killed in North Africa

(Continued from Page One) later were forced to land in mid-ocean, although without injury to the occupants.

Tragedy first overtook the third plane of the red group. (The ships flew in four divisions bearing the colors red, white, green and black, the hues of the Italian tricolor and Fascism.)

Captain Recagno lifted the ship off the water, but it fell with a crash after reaching about 100 feet altitude and struck heavily to the surface. Sergeant Luigi Fois, the mechanic, was riding in the right pontoon and was killed as it crumpled. The two pilots, both officers and the radio operator were injured.

Natal Fetes Fliers

NATAL, Brazil.—Thousands of natives of this far northeastern tip of the South American continent gathered here today to gaze in amazed admiration at ten great Italian seaplanes which yesterday flew across the Atlantic to complete one of the greatest achievements of aviation history.

On Friday the air caravan will continue its journey down the Brazilian coast to Rio de Janeiro, alighting in Botofogo Bay near the Presidential palace.

There was an official reception for the fliers this afternoon, tendered by state and federal authorities, with a special program in their home at the Aero Club tonight. There will be other entertainments for them tomorrow.

Sandino Prefers Land's Ruin to American Rule

(Continued from Page One) Latin America repudiates American military intervention. I assure you that Sandino would lay down arms and our country would be completely and automatically pacified if the marines are withdrawn. Sandino and his followers are only defending Nicaragua's autonomy. We do not demand the withdrawal of the marines as a favor but as an act of undeniable and impending justice."

Moncada Opposes Withdrawal of United States Marines from Nicaragua. President Jose Moncada of Nicaragua believes that it would be unwise to withdraw American marines from the country at this time. The President said he would like, however, to insure additional cooperation of Nicaraguans with the marines in an effort to stamp out banditry.

"We have many patriotic Nicaraguans," he said, "who would offer their services and peculiar knowledge to give such cooperation in an effort to bring about lasting peace in the bandit-infested regions."

U. S. Gives Warning to Liberia to End Slavery

(Continued from Page One) University, Nashville, Tenn., American; Dr. Cuthbert Christy, Englishman, appointed by the league, and Arthur Marclay, Liberian.

Though there have been important leaks, the text of the report has not yet appeared. It will be released here and in Geneva for publication on Sunday, January 17.

Threat Follows Investigation

This virtual threat to break off relations with Liberia is followed by the charge that that country, founded as a haven for escaped American Negroes before the Civil War, consented with "extreme reluctance" to the recent investigation conducted there by a commission composed of representatives of the United States, the League of Nations and Liberia.

Nearly all the high officials of Liberia, including the vice presidents of the country, were found by this commission guilty of responsibility for conditions existing among laborers there, including those employed on huge American rubber plantation developments.

Although Sam Reber, American charge d'affaires in Liberia, has made "frequent inquiries," the American note says, Liberia has thus far failed to submit definite plans for wiping out slavery. The note adds that all the "officials whose guilt was established . . . continued to hold office."

The Liberian government, the State Department at Washington charges, has "encouraged measures of retaliation against these helpless people," a reference to witnesses who appeared before the investigating commission, many of whom were intimidated before they gave their evidence.

Belgium to Retain Chinese Concession

(Continued from Page One) Russia include rubber boots, excellent tinned foods, furs, wines and liquors, and all of them are cheap. It is reported that the Soviet intends to favor the Russians in freight rates on the Chinese Eastern Railway so as to undercut oil prices drastically. The general opinion here is that the Soviet is seeking to accomplish economically what she failed to do politically in China and that she will drive out the foreigners by extinguishing their foreign trade.

The Soviet representatives deny dumping, and assert that their sales are profitable, but it is undeniable that these luxuries are not obtainable in Vladivostok and elsewhere in Soviet territory. This condition has caused the smuggling recently of Russian manufacturers from Manchuria into Siberia.

The aggressive policy of the Russians on the Chinese Eastern Railway has strengthened their position and prestige in Manchuria, so that the Moscow conference now wants merely a written acknowledgment of existing conditions. Under a pretense of hard times, the railway administration is discharging many old employees whose loyalty is doubtful and is replacing them gradually with officials from Moscow.

Briton to Read Own Will In Movie After Death

LONDON.—The reading of the will of an elderly retired Birmingham manufacturer will be a novel and probably embarrassing experience for the beneficiaries and others whom he invited to attend the ceremony.

The testator, according to the Daily Express, has had a talking motion picture made of himself reading the document. The order of the seats before the screen have been arranged so he can address each one individually.

Not all the invited guests are beneficiaries. In an address from the screen he points out the faults and virtues of each. These criticisms will be delivered immediately after his cremation.

Anti-Lynching Body Adds Monroe N. Work

Tuskegee Authority Made Member of Southern Group Seeking Cause and Cure of Lynching

ATLANTA, Ga.—Prof. Monroe Work, Director of Research and Records of Tuskegee Institute, has been added to the membership of the Southern Commission on the Study of Lynching at its second meeting in this city. The Commission now numbers eleven, the colored representatives being Dr. R. R. Moton, Dr. John Hope, Dr. Charles S. Johnson, President B. F. Hubert, and Prof. Work. The white members are Geo. F. Milton, Dr. W. J. McGlothlin, Dr. W. P. King, Julian Harris, Dr. Howard W. Odum, and Alex Spence.

At its meeting here the Commission heard reports from its investigating staff as to the facts behind several lynchings of the current year, commended the work already done, and ordered that it be continued. The investigations are being made by Arthur Raper of the Commission on Interracial Cooperation and Prof. Walter Chivers of Morehouse College. The purpose of the study, it was stated, is two-fold: To secure a more complete understanding of all the factors involved in lynching; and to discover methods by which such crimes can be prevented or their perpetrators brought to justice.

It was announced that the Law School of the University of North Carolina has agreed to make for the Commission a comprehensive study of the legal aspects of lynching. This will include a digest of all special laws now on the statute books for the prevention of mob violence and the apprehension and punishment of lynchers, as well as a study of the practical effectiveness of these measures. It is thought possible that this study may result in the preparation of a uniform anti-lynching law for the various states.

Walter Cohen Dies Suddenly

Was Port Collector of New Orleans, La., for Several Years

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Walter L. Cohen, comptroller of Customs, port of New Orleans, La., died in that city early Monday morning after an illness of several weeks, it was learned by political groups here late Monday afternoon.

Cohen, it is said, fell sick two weeks ago and came here for a political conference with some Republican leaders. He returned home a very broken down man and the end, although sudden, was not expected by many of his friends.

Cohen has been in Louisiana politics for a number of years. He was at one time National Committeeman from that State and a controlling factor of Republican affairs after the death of Col. William Lewis. He was appointed collector of customs for the port of New Orleans under the late President Harding. In recent months pressure had been brought to bear by white Republicans of the South who have been seeking nomination for his post.

It was announced that the Law School of the University of North Carolina has agreed to make for the Commission a comprehensive study of the legal aspects of lynching. This will include a digest of all special laws now on the statute books for the prevention of mob violence and the apprehension and punishment of lynchers, as well as a study of the practical effectiveness of these measures. It is thought possible that this study may result in the preparation of a uniform anti-lynching law for the various states.

Mrs. Jessie Daniel Ames told of the campaign against lynching, inaugurated by Southern white women under the auspices of the Interracial Commission, as evidenced by recent meetings of representative women in Atlanta and Dallas, at which vigorous statements repudiating lynching as a defense of womanhood were issued. This step is to be followed, it was stated, by the organization in each Southern State of a strong committee of women pledged to oppose this type of crime. The Commission expressed its thanks and appreciation to Mrs. Ames and her associates in this work. Resolutions were adopted also heartily commending the authorities at Maryville, Missouri, for their effective work in preventing a threatened lynching in that city a few days ago.
