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## Garveyism and Its Strategy

GARVEYISM is a philosophy propounded by a great Negro, Marcus Garvey, for the reorganization of the shattered morale, spirit and fortunes of the Negro Race. This philosophy is international in scope and therefore affects the lives of not only the Negroes but of the non-Negroes as well.

The only other philosophy that is comparable at all to Garveyism in scope and sweep is Communism. They are both international, anti-imperialist and anti-exploitative-capitalism.

Garveyism seeks to rebuild the fortunes of a once great race, while Communism seeks to redistribute the goods of the world in the interest of the hitherto down-trodden classes. While Garveyism is immensely interested in equitable distribution of wealth among the Negroes of the world it does not waste its time propounding theories about distribution of goods we have not got. And consequently the emphasis of Garveyism has been upon methods of capturing of the instruments of production by and for the Negro.

Since we must capture potential power, both political and economic, we have to plan our strategy as to enable the Negro wherever he is to secure that power with minimum of sacrifice. What we mean is to use tactics in different countries which will be adjusted only after studying that particular country in its social and political conditions. Garveyism is the same throughout the world its methods of tackling its problems in different centers will have to be different.

Here we have a lesson to learn from our Communist friends. The high priests of Communism have built factions in their group by insisting upon formulating plans of attack in different countries, based upon purely doctrinaire theories. That will be disastrous to any political philosophy that intends to achieve practical results.

We are now on the eve of going forward with our program with redoubled energy, and we have to do intensive studying of the Negro problem in different parts of the world. We have every confidence that our chief will prepare his strategy accordingly and with caution competent and intelligent men and women who are honest and sincere.

## Journalism and Education

JOURNALISM in its broadest and truest sense is an institution of education. Someone has very fittingly described journalism as "a Profession of Daily Letters."

And this function of daily or weekly or periodic education, as the Bible may be, has been abandoned nowadays by an increasing number of journals in favor of an alluring but pretentious theory of "interesting the reader." Judged by the practice of the journals believing in this theory, known as yellow journals, "naked fiction vendors" and what not, reader-interest has simply come to mean pampering to the ignorance, prejudice, little passions and jealousies and vulgarities of mass-readers. They are simply trying to feed the ignorant with more and more ignorance, and that too, day in and day out, week in and week out.

And the apology for this state of affairs is that high journalism, by which is meant journalism that carries on its true functions, does not pay whereas yellow journalism piles up money for both the publishers and readers. But it is not entirely true to facts. A paper with a personality, with an ideal, with a policy can make money as well as a yellow journal. The main thing is honest, fearless and courageous service that the public has a right to get.

Of all the peoples in the world the Negro needs education the most, and what do most of our papers offer him? Nothing but yellow journalism, sensational stuff, murders, scandals, gossip. The publishers of these journals claim to have initiated their standards from the successful white publishers, such as Messrs. Hearst and MacFadden. The tragedy about imitating is that more often than not mostly wrong things are imitated.

There are journalistic standards of such successful papers as the New York Times and which should be copied by at least a few of our publishers, and thus fulfill the true mission of journalism, that of both entertainment and instruction. We are glad that the Negro World is endeavoring to fulfill the latter mission to the best of its ability and successfully, too.

What will be the outcome of it? We fear that there will be no peace in Palestine as long as Great Britain plays her imperialist role there. We only hope that the unhappy, though audacious, Zionists will not again have those harrowing experiences of race riot of a year and a half ago.

## What Progress Did Negro Make in 1930

Although the effects of the business depression which afflicted the country were felt first by the business and industrial interests, there has been advanced as well as other preparations to accomplish the same end. They were not very satisfactory and alarming symptoms were produced.

About the middle of the nineteenth century cholera was introduced in Great Britain to produce lack of feeling towards pain. Either made its appearance in America about the same period. These have enjoyed great popularity. Through their use many voluious works of surgery have been performed. The most timid individual need not be fearful of pain to undergo a surgical operation when they are employed. The child-bearing mothers have been much relieved. In course, the administration is not always necessary in these cases.

In dentistry nitrous oxide gas is commonly used. Whenever short operations, such as opening an abscess or removing a toe nail the same substance can be of use. It is very safe. The accidents reported are few in comparison to the number of cases treated. Deaths from general anaesthetics are usually due to some fault in the makeup of the individual.

Whenever spinal work is to be done, an extant that pain is not felt. Spraying with other may also be used. Such methods give only transient insensibility, but the operation must work quickly. A certain amount of pain may be felt during the thawing process.

Cocaine acts very efficiently on the mucous membrane in producing anaesthesia. This substance is so much abused by inconsiderate individuals that its use as such is much on the decline.
