## The Complete Story of Kid Chocolate's Recent Plight Told

HAVANA, Cuba.—"If the kid cannot return to New York, I shall stay with him here."

So declared Lino (Pincho) Gutierrez, manager of Kid Chocolate, in an exclusive interview here. The statement was made following the reports that a week existed between the boxer and his manager and that Jimmy J. Johnson, matchmaker of the Madison Square Garden in New York, was the kid's new manager.

Chocolate has declared that while he follows his profession he will not work under the direction of Gutierrez and that the only thing that will break down his professional connection with the latter will be retirement from the ring.

"Victim of Consul"

Bitter feeling was expressed by Senator Gutierrez regarding the action of the consular officers of Cuba in New York, and he declared Chocolate to be a "victim of a consul."

Senator Gutierrez said:

"With great surprise, I read that Augusto Merchan, has declared that through my fault, the affair could be settled. I appealed to the gentlemanly quality of the aforementioned gentleman to show the contrary of what I have to say here.

"Monday night, a little after Chocolate's fight with Lester, Mr. Baranco, representative of the United States and two American policemen called, carrying orders for detaining the kid to the extradition. All of the attention was paid by newspapers and persons of influence present, were directed to return to the consul, but he carried orders from the consul and that he could do nothing.

"I will be done."

"On the next day at 11 o'clock when we were in the Federal Court, Baranco appeared with me in which I called his attention to other duties more important, and he refused to attend and called the consul and that the latter would call by telephone. I answered him in front of the consul and do not have to ask favors of Mr. Merchan."

"The judge, who was on our side, said to the consul: 'Let us arrange this in the best manner. We can put him under house arrest, but he refused. A little later the judge said: 'Let us put him under the custody of the manager of the kid, but he refused. Mr. Merchan refused. Before all present, the consul presented the petition of extradition for the kid, and that of taking possession of a woman by force in order to accomplish one of his ends."

"Change Charge"

"Before that accusation, Chocolate was sent again to prison and judgment was suspended until Thursday. That day the consul, Mr. Merchan, presented himself, changing the charge to seduction. The interpreters had been mistaken in the exact translation of the word 'rapo.'"

"Was it bad faith? I cannot tell, but it remains with me that Chocolate was a prisoner, it was only through the fault of the consul. Then the kid declared before the Federal Court."
