Five Million For Jobs

Following a meeting of the Committee of the whole yesterday, Mayor Walker announced that \$5,000,000 in federal bonds had been voted to carry on unemployment relief work until August 1. This appropriation was subject to approval by the Board of Estimate, the Mayor declared.

In making the announcement, the Mayor pointed out that the new appropriation will make a total of \$81,000,000 spent by the city of New York in the fiscal year 1932-33. It is expected that this money will provide jobs for about 250,000 emergency workers as well as the direct relief distributed by the Home Relief Bureau for 60,000 families and 10,000 war veterans.
