Ex-Emperor to Oust Selassie, Is New Report

ADDIS ABEBA, Abyssinia.—Like Napoleon, the former Emperor Yeassu of Abyssinia has escaped captivity and is gathering a large army about him to march on the present ruler, Haile Selassie.

But, unlike Napoleon, Yeassu fled garbed as a woman, it was revealed today and is awaiting the end of the rainy season in the wilds of Gojam, before he tries to settle his score with Selassie.

Emperor Haile Selassie announced that he had sent his Minister of War and an army into Gojam to settle the matter now. It is reported, however, that the Emperor's soldiers are deserting him in favor of the former ruler.

The present trouble apparently began late in May when Ras Hailou, Governor of the Province of Gojam, was arrested for plotting. Presumably Yeassu escaped then. The former Emperor had been in captivity for fifteen years since he was deposed by Haile Selassie. He had been in custody of an influential noble, the Ras Kassa. The Ras Kassa was a virtual prisoner here today.

Reports filtering into the capital had it that a large and influential following was gathering about Yeassu, who is a grandson of the man who welded Abyssinia into a modern kingdom, Emperor Menelik II.

When Menelik died in 1913, Yeassu succeeded him, but he was deposed when he tried to introduce Mohammedanism into a nation that had been Christian for many centuries.

Militarist Heads New German Cabinet

BERLIN.—President Paul von Hindenburg tonight commissioned Lieut. Col. Franz von Papen, former military attaché at Washington and an influential member of the conservative wing of the Centrist party, to form a "national concentration" Cabinet.

The man chosen to succeed Dr. Heinrich Brüning, who resigned as Chancellor lately after the President had refused to affirm confidence in him, was compelled to leave the United States with Captain Karl Boy-Ed in December, 1915, for alleged violation of neutrality.

He has been active in promoting Franco-German political and industrial relations.

A split second later the .25 caliber slug from the automatic of a young gunman—one of four who were holding up the place—drilled through his skull.

Burke, six years on the force, was reported near death last night in Harlem Hospital. The four holdup men and an alleged accomplice seized later, are under arrest.

Tenn. Bars Negro Ban In Primaries

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—The Democratic State Primary Board failed to take action today on a resolution signed by five of the six candidates for the Governorship which was designed to bar Negroes from the primary Aug. 1.

It also was the design of those sponsoring the resolution that the Democratic party in Tennessee be officially designated as "the white man's party."

Speaking in opposition to the resolution at a meeting of the primary board, Mitchell Long of Knoxville said:

"I can imagine nothing that the American Civil Liberties Union would rather hear than that we have passed this resolution, for they could say, 'Tennessee's busted loose again.'"

An opinion from the State Legal Department said the resolution would be "entirely inefficacious." Two recent United States Supreme Court decisions were cited. The first held invalid a Texas law seeking to bar every one except white Democrats from a primary. A later statute, seeking to empower the Texas Democratic Executive Committee to prescribe qualifications of voters, likewise was held unconstitutional.

Massie Citizenship Safeguarded by Gov.

FRANKFORT, Ky.—Any rights of citizenship Lieutenant Thomas H. Massie may have lost in his native state of Kentucky by his conviction in the Honolulu honor slaying were restored in an executive order from Governor Ruby LaFoon today.

No Clash of Colors in D. C. B. E. F. March

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Seven thousand nine hundred veterans of the World War, colored and white, shoulder to shoulder, marched down historic Pennsylvania avenue Tuesday night, while 100,000 people lined the "Nation's Parade Ground," breaking the impressive silence of the grim marchers with sporadic outbursts of applause.

Coming from all parts of the United States, World War veterans have been converging on the Capital all this week, in a Bonus Expeditionary Force (B.E.F.) to demand bonus action by Congress. Arriving by truck, freight trains, passenger autos and on foot, they have grown in number to about ten thousand, over two thousand of whom are colored.

During the war Uncle Sam segregated the races into colored and white regiments. Now that the war veterans are ragged, hungry and in need, now that they want to impress the country by their numbers, all lines are down.

Negroes, usually forced to march in the rear, marched at the front, middle and both sides. Not only did they parade together, but many who hiked here from distant points, ate and slept together.

SLEEPS 12 YEARS; DIES
GOLDSBORO, N. C.—An illness that kept E. A. Pate, white, in a condition resembling sleep for 12 years, ended Tuesday with his death at his home. He was stricken when he was 45 years old and resisted all efforts to arouse him, except to an extent for him to eat a bit at meal times.

Six Thousand Followers Jam Auditorium

Divine Case Rests After Passionate Plea of Attorney Thomas. Suspended Sentence Expected. Harlem Thousands Pin Faith in Leader. Six Thousand Followers Jam Newark Auditorium. Funeral Services for Judge Smith Held Last Saturday.

Standing before a crowded courtroom in Brooklyn Friday morning, Attorney Jas. C. Thomas of 15 Park place, New York, made a passionate plea for a certificate of reasonable doubt for his client, Father Divine, who was sent to jail for a year by Supreme Court Justice Smith on May 25th. Supreme Court Justice Burt Jay Humphrey heard the plea and reserved decision. As we looked up from the reporters' table every now and then, we observed the steady eyes of a crowded court fastened on the form of a youthful attorney whose only thought seemed to be the judge before him. The judge was all attention. There was curious apprehension on the faces of the listeners—and seriousness in the heart of the lawyer whose logic removed every prejudiced thought—if there were prejudiced thoughts in this noted case.

Justice Smith Buried
Many rumors began to fill the air in Harlem the day Father Divine was sentenced to jail by Justice Lewis Smith. It was rumored that in the ranks of the followers of Father Divine, that Judge Smith would meet some fate. Others claimed that the judge was biased in his decision. These rumors were occasioned by a belief lurking in Divine's followers' breasts that the Justice had been too severe in his sentence of the great leader. They cited prejudice also because Divine was a Negro. They believed he was being persecuted because he refused to tell where he got his money to carry on.

Justice Smith dropped dead at his home in Hempstead, L. I., after returning home in company with friends. His funeral was held at 3 p. m. Saturday afternoon from the Christ First Presbyterian Church of Hempstead, amid much pomp and honor by his associates.

Thousands Hold Faith
It will take more than jail bars to dim the popularity of the masses, if one is to judge by the packed churches and halls where his followers gather nightly, just to hear a word about him. Whatever it is, religion, hypnotism, mesmerism, psychology, or just plain "fogy," these people who go into a frenzy almost at the call of his name have "It." And it sticks.

How to Raise Money Effectively To Rescue The Negro World

Allow me to express my pleasure and appreciation to those readers of The Negro World who are responding to the appeal of the management and also that of the Hon. Marcus Garvey for aid to the working funds so admirably. And also the thoughtful divisions. These are evidence of the great determination of the true followers of the Universal Negro Improvement Association to carry their light for the redemption of Africa to the goal. However, there is yet room for all those who are willing and ready to do their little bit. Every little bit helps. I suggested to an officer of a division some time ago, the idea of starting a Negro World Club in his division. When the proposal to send four delegates from the Universal Negro Improvement Association to the League of Nations, which met in Geneva, Switzerland, September 4th, 1922, was accepted by the convention of August the same year, hopes ran high in the hearts of the ambitious. Many there were who prayed to be one of the convention's selection. Notwithstanding this, however, the warmest congratulations were received by those of us selected, and not the least feeling was manifested when the convention finally decided upon its four delegates. The delegates selected were in the order as follows: The late Mr. George O. Marke, chairman; Professor J. J. Adams, secretary; William La Vane Sherrill, and Professor James O'Malley.

Mr. George O. Marke was born in Africa, educated at Oxford, and at one time Town Clerk of Sierra Leone, British West Africa. He was a Haitian by birth, was educated in the primary schools of Haiti and America. Professor Adams, being a master of the French language, also acted as our interpreter. Several times, while on the continent, he was highly complimented on the excellence of his French.

Mr. William L. Sherrill, an American Negro by birth, was educated in the best schools of America and had wide experience as a lecturer.

The "educational test" in the hands of white registrars and judges of elections given the arbitrary power by a last minute ruling of Attorney General George G. Brummitt, was used to plug up the gap through which some 3,000 colored voters had blasted their way into the Democratic party by registering as Democrats.

If the Africans who are now engaged in the business and professional world could only realize the great amount of good Garveyism is doing for them, they would refrain from casting aspersions on such a wonderful movement as the Universal Negro Improvement Association.

being made at present to salvage from the crucible all the good that is left and no longer follow of cricket should stand aside during the operation. As a last resort and in a final effort to place the best men on the field in the remaining trial matches and to ultimately secure the cream of New York cricketers for the matches against the Australians, the Executive Committee in conjunction with the selection committee have decided to pick the two test match teams a week hence and have them play in the remaining trials. This has a two fold benefit. First, they will get a closer understanding from the men set for their availability, and secondly, the men will get the inestimable benefit of playing together before July 14, 16 and 18. It is understood that by June 22 the teams will be picked and indicated to give all the players a week's practice. The players will be called for this purpose as soon as the time arrives. Men not answering this call will be dropped from consideration unless reasonable excuse is forthcoming. For those who intend to witness these stirring contests it might be of interest to stress this point. These games against the visitors will all start luncheon at 11:30 with a short luncheon period and the usual tea interval. Arrangements have been made to convert Inisfaul Park into a suitable place to entertain our guests for the three days. We say our with the full significance of the meaning of the word in its true sense. The vanished hospitality of the EMPIRE STATE is at stake and will be watched from every corner of the world where men follow the fortunes of the Old English Game.

On Sunday, June 19, the fourth test will be played at Commercial Field, Brooklyn, against a strong team headed by Mr. Lander. Mr. E. H. Margerson, who will captain the side in the one-day match against the Australians, will be the captain also on Sunday. The team will comprise E. Clarke, W. Claffey, C. Brown, E. Hollar, J. Bullen, G. Butterfield, E. Trotman, C. Thomas, J. Gorion, Wiloughby E. Hackett and F. Hines. Our American friends are invited to witness all the trials and to attend the Australian games as a part of their better understanding with their brothers under the skin. We enjoy baseball, come and enjoy yourself at our national pastime.

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Not Yellow Escapes Doom

LURAY, Va.—Because he is dark and not "yellow," Leon Fry, 17-year-old farm worker of this neighborhood, was released on \$1,500 bond last Friday, of charges that he criminally attacked a 16-year-old white girl here. The alleged attack occurred April 27, as the girl was walking along a wooded lane on her return from school. Immediately following the girl's information that she had been attacked, authorities sought Fry, who took refuge in a thicket near here. He was sought by an armed posse, which was withdrawn when Nathan Sedwick, white farmer for whom the youth worked, promised to deliver him to authorities.

Placed in the Harrisonburg jail for safe keeping, the youth denied any guilt in the attack. The sheriff and Fry's employer both attested to their belief in his innocence. Feeling very much embarrassed, the jail guard against threatened violence.

The girl told Sedwick that her attacker was a "yellow" Negro, whereas Fry is very dark. In addition, all of Fry's time on the day of the attack was accounted for with the exception of 15 minutes.

Brought to trial June 3, the youth was released under \$1,500 bond for a new trial, when the jury failed to agree. The bond surety was furnished by Sedwick, who is a former sheriff of Craig county.

SPRING is supposed to be preeminently the season for the escapades of Cupid. But judging from the month of June, which is popularly considered to be the month of brides and roses, Cupid takes a long time to fasten his snares on the young men whose fancy "turns to thoughts of love." Or is it that the brides-to-be care for roses more than for their beaux and thus put off Cupid's call until "it gets hot"? In any case, Cupid is not doing a thorough job of it—is he?

But there are other things in the month of June besides brides and roses, and they are the brides (or hurdles) and thorns. Naturally our fancy turns to Commencement addresses and the Conventions at Chicago which are as overwhelming in one sense or another as the roses and brides. At times life is not rosy at all even with roses, brides, commencements and conventions. They are all liable to become extremely boring.

N. A. A. C. P. an Imposter

Since the Parker case the officers have given much time to politics. That was why the annual conference was held in Washington, this year. But from all returns we have been able to collect, the conference was an absolute failure along political lines, notwithstanding the amount of time given over to political discussion.

BIG BUSINESS AMONG NEGROES

Calamity howlers are alarmed because several of the large business institutions of the Race have been hard hit by the wave of economic depression, which has swept over the world like a mighty forest fire consuming fortunes large and small, and destroying big business combines everywhere. Some of our most outstanding business enterprises have felt its destructive lash. The Binga State Bank of Chicago, Illinois, the Douglass National Bank of the same community, and several smaller banking institutions have been compelled to close their doors. The National Benefit Life Insurance Company has gone into the hands of the receivers, and distress reigns in several other of our large business concerns, which are struggling to keep their heads above water.



WHAT IS NEEDED

These pessimists believe that these facts indicate the Negro's incapacity for successfully conducting business on a large scale. But this is not so. If given the required funds, equipment, experience and agencies of credit, the Negro can conduct big business as successfully as anybody else. Lack of these has been the real cause of most of the failures in Negro ventures. And let us get it out of our heads, that anytime a Negro business fails, somebody has been dishonest, or that the ability to do, is just not in the Negro. Remember that there is such a thing as an honest failure.

DEEPER ECONOMIC SUB-SOIL

Negro business is compelled at all times to face problems peculiar only to it, as well as the ordinary problems which belong to business. As I see it, the successful Negro business man must of necessity be a more astute business man than the average successful white man. The failure of these large business enterprises does not prove the Negro's inability to conduct business, if it proves anything, it proves just the opposite.

Negro business has toppled because the economic sub-soil is not deep enough to properly nourish the roots and permit them to sink to the depths necessary for the support of towering limb and branches. Our business, therefore, becomes topheavy, making it easy for a stiff wind to blow it down.

Know Thyself

We have not been able to change our race for three hundred years. No one can change our race overnight. God created us what we are, and we are going to remain what we are until Gabriel blows his horn.

Our Victory Is Assured

We are of the Negro race and we are suffering simply because we are of the Negro race, and, since we are four hundred million strong, it is for us to organize that strength to protect our race. And I want young men, middle-aged men and old men (and women) of the race also to realize that this is the age of action—action on the part of each and every individual of every race. If there is a white man who does not love the white race, to his race he is an outcast; if there is a yellow man that does not love his race, to the yellow race he is an outcast; if there is a Negro who does not love the black race, to his race such a Negro should become an outcast.

The future of the race rests in our hands. Let us not be found wanting. Let those who have caught the vision labor night and day to enlighten and inspire those who are lagging behind. Work without ceasing. We are bound to win.
